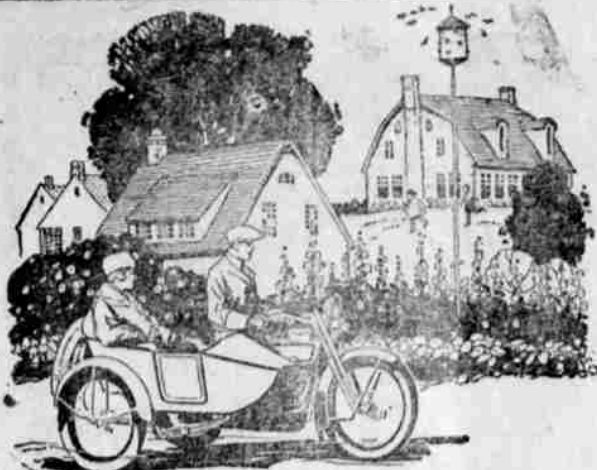

Prices Continue Slump Downward

NEW YORK, May 28.—Armin W. Riley, special assistant to Attorney General Palmer, in charge of the profiteering investigation here, today announced that after a conference with prominent hat dealers, he had obtained their promise to slash straw hat prices immediately. He said he had convinced them they were making too great profits.

Mr. Riley announced that retail grocers had agreed to conform to all price fluctuations of the wholesale market.

A corporation discontinuing its domestic business announced that a \$5,000,000 stock of shoes would be offered for sale tomorrow, at cost.

Shaves to be Cheaper.

Prices of shaves and haircuts in New York soon will be cut to 15 and 25 cents, respectively, according to Leon Worthall, general organizer of the International Barbers' union.

LEAP FOR LIFE IN AUTOMOBILE ACROSS CREEK

Charles J. Wilson Jumps Sixty Feet And Lands Safely.

MOVIE CAMERAS CLICK

Makes Leap Over Stream Near Pingree Grove; Has Done it Before.

With seven movie cameras trained on him, Charles J. Wilson of Chicago made the famous "Leap for Life" in an Elgin Six over a thirty foot creek near Elgin yesterday afternoon. The bridge over the creek, which is located on the road out of Elgin toward Pingree Grove, had been removed to add a thrill to the feat. The jump, which was made in an ordinary Elgin stock car, was put on by the Atlas Educational Film company.

Although the jump had been kept as quiet as possible to avoid a large crowd, scores of people thronged the banks of the creek, and as many more lined the sides of the road.

Takes Off From Platform. After the bridge had been removed, leaving only the steel girders, and the roads had been scraped to assure a good start, the movie men got their cameras in line and the crowd was pushed into a field at the side of the road.

In the center of the road a sloping platform was placed, the "take-off" for the leap. Beginning at a distance of about half a mile up the road, Wilson sped the crimson car towards the open stream, and hit the scraped straight-away going 60 miles an hour, amid the breathless silence of the watching throng.

Up the take-off the Elgin skimmed like a bird, and there was an audible snap from the crowd as the big car shot then the air. For a moment the loud roar of the motor and the clicking of the cameras was the only intrusion on the silence. Then, with a resounding crash that could be heard for many feet, the big car hit the road. Wilson's khaki shirt, clearly outlined against the background, showed how he had thrown himself completely out of the seat and was balancing on the steering wheel to avoid being killed with the shock.

Then Fence Into Field. Due to shifting conditions of the dusty road, the front wheel hit a rut while the car was still bouncing, and before the driver could get control, tore thru a fence into a field. Blinded by the dust and thinking that the car had turned turtle, the throng of watchers dashed as one man towards the spot. They arrived in time to see Wilson climbing out with a smile on his face. A great sigh of relief went up from the spectators; the man was unhurt and the car was in perfect condition.

Actual measurements showed the car had landed at a distance of sixty feet from where it left the ground. It had hit on the left front wheel where the weight of the driver had tipped it with an estimated impact of over thirty tons.

Wilson, who is in the employ of the Elgin Automobile company, has traveled all over the United States and South America staging this hair-raising exhibition. Several years ago he set the world's record for auto hurdling at 75 feet. Easter Sunday, at the second annual fashion show of the Elks at New Orleans, he broke this record and set a new one at 75 feet, 6 inches.

Can't Find Passengers.

"Now and then," Wilson said, "I find some young fellow that thinks he wants to ride with me when I make the leap. I'll never forget once, I was going to leap and a fellow bragged that he would ride on the hood. I told him that I would go over once to give him an idea of what it was, and then if he still felt the same way, I would pick him up and we would go over together. I made the leap and almost tipped over. About a dozen women fainted and when I came around after the fellow all that could be seen of him was his coat tails vanishing in the distance.

"I've been pretty lucky so far. All together I've made forty jumps and never had an accident. It used to get me worked up, but now it's pastime."

Fully as interesting as himself is this young dare-devil's wife. Most wives would never live through the worry of an event like this, but Mrs. Wilson is different.

"What's the use of worrying," she says, "Life isn't worth living without chances and I believe that God is with my husband when he's risking his life just as much as he is at any time."

War Heroine Dies a Pauper

BUTTE, Mont., May 28.—While a band played dirges, several thousand persons, including regular soldiers, world war veterans and Red Cross workers, walked slowly behind the hearse which bore the body of Annet Clehot Markland, French war heroine—to a pauper's grave here today.

Virtually all business was suspended in Butte during the funeral, and full military honors marked the services.

Annett Clehot served four years on the French front as an ambulance driver, first for the French and then for the American army. She was

wounded and gassed several times. Annett and Private Ralph Annett of the A. E. F. quarters corps were married following a romance amidst the burning of the and the many hardships of war. Markland brought his wife to Butte in February of last year, and the husband's love could be seen in the face of parental objections to the bride. Following the issuance of a second complaint charging her with non-support, Markland fled, leaving his wife.

Annett, a week ago, was taken to the county poor farm—a place ill from the effects of an operation made necessary by the wounds received in France, the French made no effort to live, but hearted and half starved, she was forced to find rest in the poor field.
