DEAF SOLDIERS LEARN LIP READING

Men Wounded in Neck and Throat Receive Speech Training.

POWERS ARE REGAINED

Private Who Completely Lost Power of Speech is Able to Talk Almost Perfectly After Several Months of Training.

Among the thousands of men disabled in the world war, there are about 200 practically totally deaf, and 100 with speech defects caused by wounds in jaw, neck or throat, according to a bulletin published by the war department.

Soldiers and sailors who did receive instruction in lip-reading and lessons for the correction of speech defects are now in training under the supervision of a special agent of the federal board.

One of the most interesting speech defect cases is that of Private Henry J. Koopman, who, as a result of an operation for mastoiditis, suffered what the doctors call "complete motor and sensory aphasia." In every day language, he could neither speak nor understand speech. His hospital record showed that before the operation, Koopman spoke English without an accent. After his operation he could utter a few German phrases, but his English was completely forgotten. He could neither name nor locate the parts of his body.

"Show me your arm," would say his teacher.

Koopman would look vaguely around him.

Koopman's training was started at U. S. army general hospital No. 11, at Cape May, N. J., under an expert teacher, Miss May E. Thornton.

At the end of two days the pupil could count to four. In one week he could do simple addition. At the end of two weeks he knew three parts of his body and could speak one connected sentence in English. At this time he began left-hand writing to develop the speech centers on the right side of his brain. In five months' time he could write with both hands, read simple sentences, write a short letter, and his speech was broken but intelligible. Moreover, he revealed himself as a remarkable card-player and a beautiful dancer.

Mr. Koopman is discharged from the army and receiving treatment at a New York public health service hospital. The federal board for vocational education has arranged that his speech training go on under the same teacher with whom he started at Cape May. Miss Thornton now reports that he can talk for twenty minutes without stopping.

State May Get Forestry Planes

SALEM, Or., May 28.—Whether the forestry department of Oregon will be able to finance the airplane patrol of the timbered districts of this state during the summer of 1926 in case the United States government fails to approve the appropriation bill now pending before congress, probably will be determined at a meeting of the state forestry board to be held in Portland tomorrow, according to F. A. Elliott, state forester, with headquarters in Salem.

Early in the winter the government officials announced that only one squadron of planes would be assigned to the Pacific coast this year and that this patrol would be confined to the state of California. Later communication with the Washington officials caused them to reconsider the action, and it finally was decided that planes would be sent to Oregon for patrol work in the event the state would furnish observers, guards to care for the craft when not in operation, provide landing fields and defray the costs of telephone and tele-

McAdoo Has A Big Backing

WASHINGTON, May 28.—After digging for several days into the campaign expenditures of Leonard Wood, Governor Lowden, Hiram Johnson, Senator Harding and Attorney General Mitchell Palmer, the senate investigating committee suddenly shunted off today on the trail of an overshadowing crime threatening to make all other candidates mentioned look like pikers as political spenders.

The mysteriously omnipresent boom of William Gibbs McAdoo became the particular quarry of the committee today and members of the inquiry appeared to feel that a hot scent had been obtained when Louis F. Lang, political writer of the New York American, was called to tell what he knew about a \$5,000,000 slush fund proposed to be raised to back Mr. McAdoo.

"Big Business" Involved. Mr. Lang was drawn into the inquiry by a story appearing in the New York American on May 19, written by him, which began:

"A 'big business' syndicate has been formed to underwrite William G. McAdoo's presidential campaign. At least \$5,000,000 has been collected or pledged."

The story credited the above charges to themanager of the campaign of Governor Edwards of New Jersey, another democratic presidential candidate. Mr. Lang amplified this statement by saying that he obtained first-hand information of the facts alleged in his story as early as last September, when the democratic national committee met at Atlantic City.

Roseburg Band Pleases Citizens

Who, after hearing the newly and temporarily organized local band play Saturday can deny that Roseburg needs such an organization as was presented on the occasion of the industrial parade. The band was called into existence only for a few hours and then was disorganized, but there is in the minds of nearly all residents of the city the hope that it can be revived and made permanent, for there was in its dash and brilliancy that quality of music that thrills and inspires and is needed in every city or town. The American government recognizes the power of music in its army and every regiment has its band and its musical entertainers. That which is successful in instilling in the minds of men the courage and power that was instilled by army and navy bands is worth perpetuating, and in villages, towns and cities the same power may be felt. Roseburg can and should have a band. A good example of what can be obtained has been shown. It is now up to Roseburg to get busy and obtain that thing so greatly needed in the community.

Spray Is Needed For Caterpillars

County Fruit Inspector C. E. Armstrong reports that calls are coming in from all parts of the county asking for information regarding the control of caterpillars. The caterpillars from all reports are doing a great deal of damage to orchards and the inspector has been called frequently to different sections for investigations. He states that an application of arsenate of lead spray should be made at once, the same as is done for codlin moth. Instead, however, of using three gallons of the stock mixture to 200 gallons of water, four gallons to 200 should be the mixture. All trees in the vicinity should be sprayed, the leaves being thoroughly covered with the poison. This will prove effective and will end the trouble, he states.

Appropriations to Be Asked For Soon

SALEM, Or., May 28.—Deficiency appropriations estimated at more than \$300,000 will be asked as a special meeting of the state emergency board to be held in Salem on Friday, June 4, according to an announcement made by officials here today. Issuance of the call for this session was one of the first official acts of Sam A. Kozar, secretary of state, after taking his oath of office today.

Approximately \$250,000 will be sought to insure operation of the so-called soldiers', sailors' and marines' educational aid act, passed by the voters of the state at the special election on June 4, 1919. There has been expended under this act \$450,000, including \$198,087.07 derived from a two mill tax levied on all the assessable property in Oregon for the year 1925, and the appropriation of \$250,000 authorized at a special session of the legislature last January.
