## CHEVROLET WINS IN AUTO RACES

**Famous Racer Wins Huge Purse When De Palma's Car Forced Out by Fire.**

### GOOD TIME IS MADE

**De Palma Made Speed of Over 94 Miles Per Hour Until Overheated Car Caught Fire and Was Forced to Withdraw.**

(By Associated Press.)

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31.—Gaston Chevrolet today won the 500-mile automobile race after De Palma was forced out by fire. Joe Boyer led the field for the first 250 miles, with Chevrolet second and Reen Thomas third, De Palma holding the fourth position. Boyer's time was 2 hours, 42 minutes and 26 seconds, an average of 91.22 miles an hour. Boyer, however, dropped back, while De Palma forged ahead and with 50 miles to go De Palma led, Chevrolet second, Chassagne third and Reen Thomas fourth. Boyer was in fifth place. De Palma's average speed was 94.94 miles per hour, the time for the 450 miles being 4 hours, 58 minutes, 33 seconds. At the 467 mile mark De Palma's car caught fire, forcing him out of the race, Chevrolet holding the lead to the finish.

It was the most famous field of drivers that ever faced a starter that lined up at the Indianapolis motor speedway at 10 o'clock for the start of the eighth international 500-mile sweepstakes. The largest prize ever offered, \$70,000, was the prize in the race. For the first time in history machines of 183 cubic inches piston displacement and 1600 pounds weight were seen in racing competition. The dream of all drivers since the birth of the horseless carriage has been to get high speed and power from the smallest engines possible. The race at Indianapolis will do more to work out the kinks of this mechanical problem than any other event, according to automobile engineers.

Among the drivers entered were Ralph De Palma, Jules Goux, Rene Thomas and Howard Wilcox, all previous winners at Indianapolis, Cliff Durant, Louis Gaston and Arthur Chevrolet, Roscoe Saries, Joe Boyer, Ray Rooney, Andre Bollot, Jean Porporato, Jack Seales, Ira Vail, J. Ellingboe, C. G. Howard, Ralph Mulford, Jean Cassagne, Art Klein, Kurt Hiltke, Willie Haupt, Frank Elliott and Waldo Etein.

Barney Oldfield, veteran auto racer, passed the race leading the field about the 2 1/2-mile brick track for the first lap.

## 54 Lady Democrats Will Go to Frisco

NEW YORK, May 31.—Led by Mrs. John Suerwin Crosby, called "the mother of New York women democrats," a special train carrying 54 women delegates and alternates to the national democratic convention in San Francisco will depart from New York June 19. This will be the first expedition of its kind in the United States. Many of the women will be accompanied by their husbands, children or other relatives. The party will be augmented by delegates from other states at various points enroute to Chicago, and after the convention the members will visit Pike's Peak, Colorado Springs, the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, Riverside, Hollywood and Los Angeles and the Catalina Islands. The return will be by way of the Canadian Rockies, reaching New York on the evening of July 11.

The delegates-at-large from New York are Elizabeth Marbury and Harriet May Mills, and the alternates-at-large are Mrs. Maurice Connolly, of Corona, L. I., and Mrs. Nellie Hewitt, of Carthage, N. Y.

Mrs. Crosby organized the first Women's Democratic club in the United States in 1904. It was located here and subsequently, in 1912, she founded the Women's National Democratic League. Two years later she established a New York state branch of the national body. Mrs. Crosby says she cherishes no illusions as to what women, in their first actual participation in a national political convention, will be able to accomplish. She said, however, she and most of the other women delegates—they will constitute more than 300 of the 1028 in the gathering—have certain ideas which will be discussed at a caucus before the convention assemblies and that they will be submitted to the platform committee in the form of resolutions.

Some of these ideas, Mrs. Crosby said, were government ownership of oil wells, and coal mines, railroads and other public utilities; a modification of the prohibition enforcement act to permit the manufacture and sale of "light wines and beer"; a plank to make it a felony to profiteer in necessities; higher pay for postal employees; advocacy of the Sheppard-Towner "maternity bill," providing for government care for every expectant mother and her child and making it unlawful for anyone to employ a woman in that condition; more rigid child labor laws; shorter hours for working women, 12,000,000 of whom are now said to be in industries and professions; more equitable taxation and the stimulation of building and other industrial

enterprises by the removal of restrictive burdens.

SANTA ROSA, Cal., June 1.—In honor of Luther Burbank, the famous horticulturist, several hundred high school students and members of the faculty participated in a gorgeous May fete, which told an allegorical story of Burbank's love for the sunshine of central California, and how he used it to develop new plant life.

The God of Rain, the Sun God, Mother Ceres, the Goddess of Agriculture, the Egyptian King, the Grecian Maidens and Terra with her elements of earth, were characters in the pageant.

## Cat Census Taken On Board Vessel

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 1.—A cat census has been taken aboard the super-dreadnaught Mississippi, at Los Angeles harbor, with the result that the largest cat was found to bear the smallest name and the smallest cat the longest.

The big cat with the small name is "Flo" and the little cat with the large name is "Pericla Desdemona De." Other cats are called "Sogufus," "Sausalito," "Seattle," "Marcella" and "Baltimore City."

## Auto Bandits to Be Detected Easily

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 1.—Automobile bandits will have to acquire a speed exceeding that of electricity if they expect to slip through the proposed San Francisco police cordon. An electric winker system is planned whereby signals will be flashed to patrolmen on various "beats."

DES MOINES, Ia., June 1.—The race between U. S. Senator Albert B. Cummins for renomination against Col. Smith W. Brookhart, a candidate for the senator's seat, furnishes the most interesting feature nationally of Iowa's primary election June 7. There is no presidential preference at stake in this election. Until shortly before the list of candidates for the primary closed Senator Cummins had no opposition. Since Col. Brookhart entered the race, however, both have been conducting active campaigns in all parts of the state. The opposition to Senator Cummins has attacked the railroad bill and other work of his. He has been equally vigorous in his reply and defense. The only democratic candidate for United States Senator is Claude R. Porter, of Centerville.

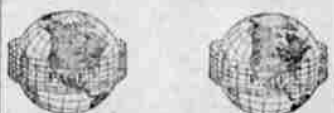
