IMPORTANT RULING OF SUPREME COURT

Ohio Wets Get Jolt on Prohibition Amendment Issue In Decision.

SUFFRAGISTS WIN POINT

Validity of National Prohibition Amendment Left Undecided—President Need Not Pay Income Tax on His Salary.

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, June 1.—The United States supreme court today held that federal constitutional amendments cannot be submitted for ratification to referendum provisions in those states having referendum provisions in their constitutions. The court also declared inoperative the Ohio state constitutional referendum amendment, in so far as it affects the ratification of federal amendments. The Ohio state supreme court decrees dissolving the injunction proceeding brought to prevent submission of the prohibition and women's suffrage amendments to voters, were set aside by the court.

Shays at Prohibition.
WASHINGTON, June 1.—The supreme court today again today to decide the validity of the prohibition amendment and the measure providing for enforcement of the act. A recess was taken by the court until next Monday, when the present term begins.

Don't Have to Pay.
WASHINGTON, June 1.—Provisions in the war tax revenue act requiring the president of the United States to pay income tax on his salary, was today declared unconstitutional by the supreme court.

Favored Anarchists.
WASHINGTON, June 1.—Charging that Louis F. Post, assistant secretary of labor, had a "prevalent sympathy for criminal anarchists," U. S. General Palmer today told the house committee that in dealing with attempts of the government to rid this country of dangerous aliens, Post had employed a "self-willed, autocratic substitute of his own mistaken personal viewpoint for obligations of the public law."

Propose Increased Salaries.
WASHINGTON, June 1.—Increased salaries for postal employees amounting to approximately thirty-three millions of dollars the first year, effective July 1, was recommended in a report to congress by the joint congressional session.

Open Trade Offices.
LONDON, June 1.—As a result of the conference yesterday between Lloyd George, British premier, and Gregory Kressin, Russian bolshevik minister on trade, and members of the British cabinet, the soviet government of Russia has been granted permission to immediately open trade offices in London.

Russians Fall Back.
LONDON, June 1.—Russian bolshevik forces fighting against the Poles and Ukrainians south of Kiev, have retreated to new positions after an engagement with superior enemy forces, says an official Moscow dispatch.

Quaker Oats Co. Wins.
WASHINGTON, June 1.—Government appeals in the federal anti-trust suit against the Quaker Oats company was dismissed today by the supreme court on motion of the government attorneys.

Bubonic Plague Alarms.
VERA CRUZ, June 1.—President Wilson has offered to send hospital ships and nurses, with a corps of doctors and such medical supplies as are necessary, for immediate relief of bubonic plague sufferers and to assist in combating the disease, which has appeared here. Eleven authentic cases have developed here to date, of which five have resulted in death.

WASHINGTON, June 1.—The house today adopted a resolution providing for a sine die adjournment of congress at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

New Bridge in Chicago is Opened

CHICAGO, June 1.—Ten thousand tons of steel, Chicago's new boulevard link bridge, settled into place recently with a whirring of gears, and for the ninth time in 115 years north and southern Chicago were connected by a direct lake front route.
The new bridge, a double deck bascule, or "jack knife" type, is a triumph of engineering skill. When the draw is opened for passing ships the two immense "leaves" tower 150 feet into the air. A broad boulevard viaduct leads to the upper level, reserved for pleasure vehicles only, while trucks and drays rumble over the lower passageway. The bridge cost \$16,000,000 and more than 20 years was spent in its planning and construction.

An important business transaction was completed in this city today when the Poulsen restaurants, two of the most prominent eating places in Roseburg, became the property of Sam Cowley, a recent arrival here from Portland. The deal was closed by the Lawrence-Cordon real estate company. The two restaurants were the property of Mrs. George Foutch, who had been conducting them since the death of her husband, and who desired to sell, owing to the fact that with the confectionery that she also owns it was impossible for her to manage them. Mrs. Foutch will remain in this city and conduct the confectionery store on Sheridan street, which is in connection with her restaurant there.

Mr. and Mrs. Cowley, the new owners, are experienced restaurant people, having been in that business for many years. Mr. Cowley will manage the eating place on Sheridan street and Mrs. Cowley will conduct the Grand Grill. They were formerly in the same business in Hillsboro, and also in Portland, but came to this city because they desired to live in a smaller place. Mr. Cowley stated this morning that during the time they had been here he had fallen in love with Roseburg and expected to build himself a modern bungalow and spend the rest of his life here. He also said that he would make a specialty of new and unusual dishes which heretofore have never found a place on a bill of fare in this city. Mr. Cowley will take possession tomorrow morning, and will at once begin the work of cleaning, painting and thoroughly renovating both places of business. He remarked this morning that he wished to say to the public that it would take possibly a week before he could change the menu and introduce his new dishes, but that it would be done as soon as possible. All white help will be employed in kitchen and dining room of both restaurants, and within a short time he expects to bring in several experienced cooks.
