## PALMER ATTACKED IN SENATE TODAY

Bonded Warehouses Running Wide Open in Parts of Pennsylvania.

## COTTON CROP IS SHORT

Prospects Unfavorable For Material Reduction in Cotton Goods Prices—Federal Wheat Standard is to be Maintained.

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Charges that the campaign for the nomination of Attorney General Palmer as the democratic candidate for the presidency had been conducted in Pennsylvania with an open appeal favoring distillery and brewery interests in that state, were made today before the senate investigating committee by Eugene C. Bonniwell, of Philadelphia. Bonniwell, who distributed the McAdoo stickers during the primary, stated that the saloons and bonded warehouses in some parts of Pennsylvania are now running "wide open," and that this situation is proceeding under the eyes of the department of justice, and that prohibition enforcement officers were appointed "with Palmer's advice."

**Repeals Emergency Act.**  
WASHINGTON, June 2.—By a unanimous vote today the house judiciary committee ordered out the resolution repealing all war-time legislation, excepting the Lever food control act, the trading with the enemy act and the District of Columbia rent profiteering measure.

**Cotton Crop Light.**  
WASHINGTON, June 2.—Reporting the condition of the cotton crop May 25 at 64.04 per cent of normal, the department of agriculture today announced that this is the lowest record in 50 years. The prospect for a short crop is the worst ever known, according to reports received from a general survey of the situation.

**First Choice Given.**  
WASHINGTON, June 2.—The sale of American ships to foreign interests after diligent efforts have been made by the shipping board to dispose of them to Americans, is provided for in the merchant marine bill as finally agreed upon by the senate and house conferees after an all-night session. The senate provisions providing for a permanent shipping board of seven members is retained in the measure.

**Wheat Standards Held.**  
WASHINGTON, June 2.—Continuation of the present federal wheat standards was decided today by Secretary of Agriculture Meredith.

**Johnson Wins Delegation.**  
CHICAGO, June 2.—In the first election affecting the Johnson force, in the convention, the republican national committee today voted 28 to 12 to seat delegates from the tenth Minnesota district who are counted as favorable to the candidacy of the California senator.

**Will Contest McCamant.**  
PORTLAND, June 2.—Stanford McDonald, Oregon campaign manager for Hiram Johnson, left for Chicago last night, where he goes prepared to contest the seat of Wallace McCamant. McDonald bears a petition alleging that McCamant obtained the election by fraud, and that he refused to obey the mandate of the republican party of Oregon, whose servant he is under the state election laws.

**Johnson Lead 2393.**  
SALEM, June 2.—Complete official returns from every county in Oregon, canvassed by the secretary of state, show that Hiram Johnson won over Leonard Wood in the recent primary by a plurality of 2393 votes. The official totals give Johnson 46,163, Wood 43,770, Lowden 15,576, and Hoover 14,557.

**Corporation Fined \$55,000.**  
SYRACUSE, June 2.—The John A. Roberts corporation, of Utica, N. Y., dealers in wearing apparel, was today fined \$55,000 by Federal Judge Howe, following conviction on a charge of profiteering. There were 13 counts in the indictment.

**Palmer Denies Story.**  
WASHINGTON, June 2.—Attorney General Palmer has asked the senate committee for permission to reply to Bonniwell's charges, saying that "this is the old story, and I don't care to await the transcript."

**RUMOR STARTS TROUBLE.**  
Angry because of a rumor that the new owner of the Pouch restaurant had announced his intention of bringing in some new cooks, the culinary artists of the two establishments, backed by the local cook and waiters' union, last night started a very heated argument. The cooks quit at midnight and refused to remain at work unless the report should be immediately denied. The discussion over the affair soon became very heated and almost developed into a fight before a compromise was finally reached. It was finally decided that the cooks should return to their jobs.
