Boy Scouts Start Lone Rock Camp

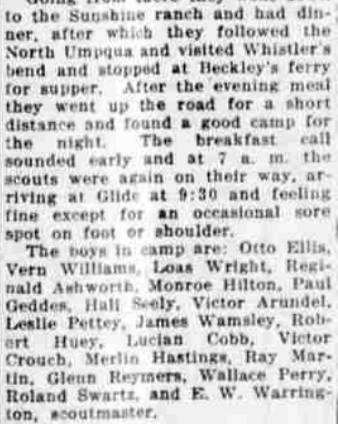

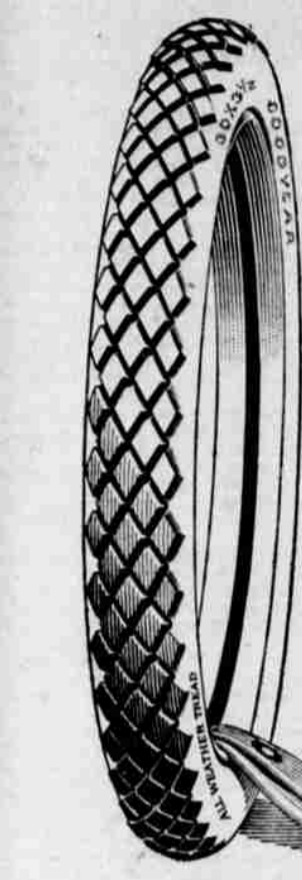
