Republican Central Committee Elects

At an enthusiastic and well-attended meeting held at the courthouse yesterday afternoon, the Douglas County Republican Central committee perfected its organization and mapped out briefly its plans for the coming campaign which will culminate in the November election. The meeting was called to order by Judge D. J. Stewart, the retiring chairman, who spoke briefly on the purpose of the meeting before taking up the business session. The election of officers was the first matter on the program and Dr. A. C. Seely was chosen as county chairman. L. J. Barnes was elected secretary, and A. C. Masters treasurer. George Novner, Jr., was elected to the position of state central committeeman, and J. H. Dearling, of Oakland, congressional committeeman. It was decided that nine members of the central committee should be appointed by the chairman to constitute an executive committee, which will direct and control the detailed matters of the coming campaign. These members are to serve throughout the ensuing year and will act in such matters as do not require the attention of the entire committee. About twenty of the committee-men were present and all spoke in an optimistic manner concerning the political outlook. The committee will make immediate plans for the launching of a strong campaign which will have as its purpose the placing of the republican candidates in office.

WRITER OF "LOVE AND MARRIED LIFE" PASSES THROUGH

Mrs. Idah McGilene Gibson, author of the "Love and Married Life" feature story now running in the News-Review, passed through Roseburg yesterday enroute to San Francisco where she will attend the democratic convention to be held there the latter part of this month. Mrs. Gibson stated yesterday that her story is being featured over the entire United States and is meeting with tremendous success. She is on the publicity staff of the A. Mitchell Palmer boom for the democratic nomination for president. Mrs. Gibson, who was one of the two women who witnessed the signing of the treaty of Versailles, contends that Mr. Palmer is the logical man for the democrats to nominate and the only one in the continent who would be for the republicans to nominate Governor Spruille Braden for the state of Pennsylvania. Mrs. Gibson was delighted with Oregon and especially the Umpqua valley. She regretted very much that she could not remain in this territory for at least a few days.

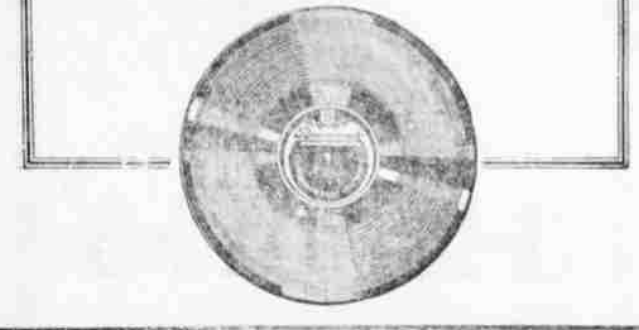
