**New Ratings Made**—  
In accordance with the new army regulations act, approved June 4, 1926, hereafter original enlistments in the regular army shall be for a period of one or three years, at the option of the soldier, and re-enlistments shall be for a period of three years. Upon completion of a three years enlistment every man will receive a bonus of \$50 on his final statements, and upon his re-enlistment for three years he will receive an additional \$50 on his first pay, making a total of \$100. The pay per month of a first class private, first enlistment, is now \$29.69 instead of \$23, as during the late war. Corporals, cooks, sergeants and musicians also receive a twenty per cent increase of pay.
