## Spray Information For Oregon Growers

Spraying under Oregon conditions—right materials, mixing and application—is brought right up to the minute in a new station bulletin, Insecticide Investigations, written by A. L. Lovett, entomologist, and published by the O. A. C. experiment station.

Improving the physical properties of the spray by means of spreaders adds to its wetting and covering power, and increases its adhesiveness, Professor Lovett declares.

Without a spreader the spray solution rests finally on the waxy surface of an apple as an irregular, blotchy coating of uneven thickness with interspaces poorly covered or without spray. With a good spreader the final result is a smooth, even, inconspicuous covering, which affords equal and perfect protection to every part of the surface.

Casinate used with hydrated lime in the ratio of 1.5 to 3.5, mixed thoroughly and then reduced to a thin paste with small additions of water and much stirring, proved one of the best spreaders. It is cheap and generally available in reasonable quantities.

To prepare 200 gallons of lead arsenate spray solution requires 3 ounces of casinate and 7 ounces of hydrated lime. Very small amounts should be experimented with until the process of making the paste is learned. A chemical reaction takes place which is readily observed when it occurs. After seeing it once the grower will better understand how to make a desirable mixture.

## Profiteering on Hat Exposed

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—Six weeks ago a prominent San Francisco woman in search of a hat went into the sumptuously appointed mural room of a large San Francisco store. One by one, from richly carved cases where the hats destined for the heads of the elite are housed to keep them from the camera-like eyes of persons who would dare to copy them, they were taken. The customer finally set her mind upon one hat.

"It is only \$55, plus a small war tax of \$4," babbled the chic attendant. The prominent woman refused to buy it and left the store.

Two days later she received a telephone call from the saleswoman informing her that the hat had been marked down to \$36.65, plus a war tax of \$2.16. She told the saleswoman to let her know if any further reduction was made in the price of the hat.

Two weeks later she stepped into the store again. There before her eyes on a table was the same hat, evicted from its home in the mural room and associating with hats which it had never before kept company with. It was the same hat with the same blue feathers, but this time it was marked \$27.50, with a war tax of \$1.25. The temptation was almost too great, but the woman decided to take one more chance. She again instructed the saleswoman to telephone her if the hat should fall to lower levels.

About a week after, another telephone call from the store informed her that the hat was now priced at \$16.75, plus a war tax of twenty cents. The woman went to the store and bought the hat. She saved exactly \$42.05 on the plain flexible straw headgear with the blue feathers which had once lived in a little palace of its own at \$55. Like most aristocracy, when it was removed from its atmosphere it was just a hat—a good hat, to be sure, but just a hat. For any hat is just a hat.

This incident actually occurred. It happened in one of the largest San Francisco concerns in the latest San Francisco concern in California. Has it happened to you? Did it represent profiteering on the part of the dealer or thrift on the part of the purchaser? Both, perhaps. But the thrift element is more important than the profiteering.

## College to Build New Structures

CORVALLIS, June 16.—Work will be rushed on new buildings at the college to provide adequate accommodations for students next school year.

The board of regents of the college has authorized the early completion of a new unit to the home economics building at an estimate of \$125,000; a women's dormitory to cost \$100,000; completion of the engineering laboratory, \$38,000; addition of a story to the mechanical hall, \$30,000; another unit with pool and the men's gymnasium, \$61,000; completion of library, including installation of steel stacks, \$35,000; and extension and completion of the heating plant, \$40,000. Plans were authorized for a recitation building intended to relieve pressure in several of the present structures.

Plans call for breaking ground immediately for some of these structures. The college will particularly have in mind the housing situation in order to care for the increase in enrollment expected in the fall term. The home economics building has been inadequate to meet growing needs of this division for a long time and effort will be made to give relief as soon as possible.

The board authorized the purchase of small plots of ground on college hill on which options have been taken.

### 15-CENT SUGAR EXPECTED.

BUENOS AIRES, June 14.—Based on the domestic price at which Frederick J. Stimson, United States ambassador to Argentina, obtained 24,000 tons of sugar for the account of the United States, plus the transportation cost, it is estimated the sugar will be landed in New York at 15 cents a pound. It probably will require five ships to transport the sugar.

President Irigoyen's action in waiving the exportation restrictions is considered here as a special favor to the United States.

It is learned that private interests have contracted for a total of 50,000 tons for exportation to the United States.

### BIG GAIN IN POPULATION.

BEND, Or., June 14.—The gain of 901.3 per cent from 536 to 2414 in the last decade by Bend's population, so far as is known is the most phenomenal growth shown for any town or city in the state of Oregon by the 1920 census.

Ten years ago Bend was a village logging camps in the immediate vicinity of Bend, it is estimated, would bring the population of 1920 up to more than 6000.

The pine milling industry was firmly established here in 1916, when plants were constructed by the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company and the Shevlin-Hixon company, with a payroll amounting to more than \$2,500,000 annually. More than 1800 persons are employed in the mills, woods and factories thru out the year.
