Future Outlook Good Says Banker

EGGERS, Or., June 15.—Between 150 and 200 bankers here today opened the 15th annual convention of the Oregon association. The sessions almost entirely were devoted to addresses and closed with a dinner dance at the Hotel Osborne given by the Eugene bankers. The picnic dinner which was to have been held on the banks of the McKenzie river was prevented by wet weather.

President C. S. Hudson in his annual address declared that the prosperity of Oregon depends upon the redistribution of all agricultural labor. As a solution to present price conditions, Mr. Hudson offered the plan of reducing the margin between the producer and the consumer; assistance to farmers' co-operative associations and marketing agencies and a square deal between the producer, the distributor and the consumer.

G. E. Bowerman, general secretary of the American Bankers' association, in a short address declared there is a more cheerful view of the financial situation throughout the United States than in a long time. That the crisis has passed and that business, both large and small, will have much better going from now on.

LEGION HOLDS MEETING

The regular bi-monthly meeting of Umpqua post of the American Legion was held at the armory last night. A number of matters of business were given attention and action taken. The applications of Ray F. Porter and Roy M. Foster to membership were received and favorably considered. The local post has been growing rapidly and now enrolls a great many of the former soldiers who are now residents of the community.

SAYS CHARGES A LIE

CHICAGO, June 15.—Major-General Leonard Wood in a signed statement tonight characterized as "a vicious and malicious falsehood" a declaration by Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler of New York that a "motley group of stock gamblers, oil and mining promoters, munitions-makers and other like persons" backed the general's campaign for the republican presidential nomination.

General Wood said that he regretted to make the statement, but that it was necessary to "brand a faker and to denounce a lie." The general declaring that the men who managed his campaign were of "extraordinary high character," said that the attack upon them "is infamous" and that Mr. Butler's action was an "attempt to ingratiate himself with certain elements which exercised a determining influence at the convention."
