**W. C. Tipton**  
*Buried Yesterday*

A very impressive service was held at the Baptist church yesterday afternoon in observance of the last rites over the body of the late W. C. Tipton. The auditorium was filled with friends of the deceased. A male quartette composed of Messrs. Fitzpatrick, Spencer, Black and Bell furnished the music. Rev. Dickson's message of consolation was as follows:

Prov. 18:24. "A man that hath friends, must show himself friendly; and there is a friend that sticketh closer than a brother."

In these days we are apt to measure a man by the money standard. We say a man is worth a thousand or a million, that he controls that amount of money in the business world; but a man's rating in the financial world does not necessarily determine his value to society. A man who has only money may be poor indeed, but a man who has friends is rich, indeed.

True friendship is not accidental. We have business acquaintances, chance acquaintances, and social relationships; there are people that we admire, people we respect, but the people to whom we are drawn in friendship are those who possess those qualities of soul, mind and heart which alone makes true friendship possible.

It seems fitting that we should today consider those qualities which developed, will not only win and hold friends, life's richest endowment, but will also enable us to enrich and beautify all human relationship.

The first quality we will notice that is essential to true friendship is the grace of usefulness. Paul says: "In lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than themselves."

This does not mean that we are to undervalue our own God-given powers, but if our vision is always inward, if our interest centers around self and the gratification of our own selfish aims and purposes, it can but result in the death of that which alone can furnish one of the essential qualities of true friendship. On the contrary, if we seek to develop the grace of usefulness, it will act upon the lives of those about us even as the rays of the morning sun act upon the opening flower, and as the flower gives forth its smile and fragrance as a reward of the sun's kiss, so the sunshine of usefulness will be rewarded by the fragrance and beauty of love and trust on the part of our friends.

The second quality is the grace of good cheer. But if along the way which we travel we have the companionship of some Prince of Good Cheer whose smile and handclasp is given without stint, how our shoulder will straighten beneath our burden and the way, somehow, become smoother. On over life's desert way,  
And your smile and good cheer may encourage—

The third quality of the friendly man is patience. The real test of friendship is not made under a cloudless sky on a summer day in June but rather in bleak winter time when the harsh, chill winds of trial beat upon us. A friend in need is a friend indeed. To be patient and wait, to trust while others doubt, is a true test of friendship. Emerson said: My friend is one before whom I may be sincere. Before him I may think aloud. The true friend is one who doubles our joys and halves our sorrows. Who knows our weaknesses, our follies, our sins, but who loves us in spite of them all.

Such a man was the one in whose memory we meet today; and how perfectly he measured up to the standard of true friendship this large audience, at this busy season of the year, assembled to do him honor, fittingly testifies. His unselfish devotion to all who needed a friend endeared him to a circle that reached far beyond the confines of family and neighborhood, touching the utmost of his acquaintanceship.

"My last" was a motto written large across his face. The last day he lived his whole face beamed with good cheer saying to his wife many times that day that he was fine and felt well. Then his face would light up that old time smile that you all remember so well. None could long remain gloomy in the presence of this Prince of Good Cheer. Patient and constant under the most trying circumstances. Once your friend he remained so. Others might fail you, but he remained true.

Yes, we have lost a friend—a big-hearted, genial, kind and constant friend. Living he won the high title of the friendly man; dead he still lives in the hearts of all who knew him.

He was a kind husband, a tender, loving father; a loyal member of his church, and genial friend.

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**GOVERNMENT BUYS**  
**BIG SUPPLY SUGAR**

Fourteen Thousand Pounds of Sugar Bought By U. S. For Distribution.

**PROMISE BEEN MADE**

Refineries State They Will Make Thirty-Four Million Pounds of Sugar Available for Commercial Canneries.

(By Associated Press.)

BUENOS AIRES, June 11.—The United States government has bought 14,000 tons of Argentine sugar.

34,000,000 Pounds Available.

NEW YORK, June 11.—Thirty-four million pounds of sugar would be available for commercial canners and preservers during the five months from June 1 to October 1, A. W. Riley, special assistant to Attorney General Palmer announced here today. Assurances that the sugar will be provided were given, Mr. Riley said, by representatives of the leading refiners.

Promise Reasonable Price.

Representatives of the canning and preserving industries told him, Mr. Riley said, that both industries were in a serious condition due to the threatened shortage of sugar. The refiners promised, he added, that the supply would be available at a reasonable price. They expressed willingness to fill the orders of all essential industries, but declared the principal obstacle was lack of transportation facilities.

The 34,000,000 pounds will be divided equally between the canners and preservers.

San Francisco Hearing Adjourns.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—The federal trade commission hearing of the charge that the Utah-Idaho Sugar company unlawfully absorbed independent refiners to remove competition was adjourned here today after a four-day session, to be resumed June 23 in New York city.
