RATHER DIFFICULT TO SEE THE KING

American Women Will be Disappointed In Desire For Presentation at Court.

RESTRICTIONS ARE MADE

Men Must Wear Certain Make of Buttons on Knee Breeches and Must Not Wear Buckles on Patent Leather Pumps Now.

LONDON, June 21.—Restrictions placed upon American women who aspire to presentation at court are such that nearly all of them in London will be disappointed this year. Only eight of the many who are reported to have applied will be presented and they must have qualifications which have surprised some of the uninitiated.

If married, their husbands must previously have been presented at a levee, they must have entered at the White House and if they have been divorced it must be indisputably shown that the divorce must have been granted in her favor in open trial at which both parties were represented in court and where alimony and custody of the children have been granted to the woman. Even in such cases the demand for legal details is so minute that the king, in deference to the ideas of the queen, it is said, has let it be known that it is inadvisable for divorcees to apply at all.

Applications of Americans for court presentations must be made to the American ambassador and he stands sponsor for those he selects. Of course this feature of the embassy work is almost as carefully guarded out of respect for the feelings of the many who try and fail, as is some of the important diplomatic correspondence. But it is known among Americans in London that the list of applications is quite long this year.

This is emphasized by an embassy circular which has come into the hands of some influential Americans here explaining what is required of successful applicants. It is longer and much more explicit than the usual circulars on the same subject and does not mince words regarding what may and what may not be expected.

Considerable space is devoted to changes in dress required. In the interest of economy the queen has decreed that women shall no longer wear head feathers or trains on their dresses at court. Some of the former adornments for the men also have been eliminated but it still is stipulated what kind of buttons they must wear on their knee breeches and that they must not wear buckles on their patent leather pumps.

SNAKE KILLS BOY.

PENDLETON, Ore., June 19.—A bite from a pet rattlesnake which had for years been a plaything caused the death yesterday of James Davis, 22, of Ukiah, Umatilla county. Davis, who since boyhood had played with reptiles, picked the snake up by the neck and was surprised by a swift strike, the fangs sinking twice into the hand. Before a doctor could be reached the poison had permeated Davis' system and he died some hours later.

HEARST ISSUES CALL.

CHICAGO, June 19.—A call to citizens to "assemble in a new independence hall, issue a new declaration of political independence and consecrate ourselves now to the human rights and popular liberties this republic was created to conserve" was issued tonight by William Randolph Hearst, in early editions of his

newspaper, the Chicago Herald, and Examiner.

The call asserts that "the republican national convention straddled on almost everything;" that Senator Johnson of California is "a safe and sane progressive to whom no reasonable or honest business could properly object," and that "big money is afraid of a man with a progressive thought, no matter how sound and how universally beneficial that idea may be." It continues:

"The defeat of Johnson was not a defeat for the man. It was a defeat for the progressive ideas he entertained."

The call further says: "The democratic party offers no refuge for independent upstanding Americans."

It then asks: "What then is left but a new party based on the old proven principles which have made our country great, our people free?" The call is signed by Hearst.
