Editor Enjoys Visit to Roseburg—Trip to Country Described.

MEETS LOCAL LODGES

Fratern Organizations Entertain Idahoan—Finds Old Friends Among Membership in Roseburg—Flowers Attract.

A. E. Gibson, P. G. M., the editor of the Idaho Odd Fellow, who recently visited Roseburg, has the following in the June issue of his paper:

Called by wire to Roseburg, Ore., by the serious illness of Capt. J. C. Gibson, a brother, the editor spent some two weeks at that point, and other places, including side trips on returning.

It was during the glad month of May, as the roses and other flowers were opening their bloom, and the luscious strawberry, for which Oregon is noted, was beginning to color and mature in the gardens of the Rose City. The air was also replete with the blossoms of the yellow locust, buckeye, hawthorn, lilac and logwood, while the purple, showy blossoms of the wistaria, and the bloom of other climbers, made the May day about all that could have been desired for comfort and pleasure.

Roseburg is a "substantial little city, with a good country tributary to it, and possesses advantages that make it desirable for home builders and those who like a nice climate, and opportunities for business or pleasure, with the minimum amount of friction and strenuousity.

Those who have lived there the longest appear to like best the town and its surroundings, and that is pretty good testimony. It is the center of a considerable fruit, livestock, farming and gardening business and has business houses and public buildings that would be creditable to a larger city. The Oregon State Soldiers Home is located here, and is a very restful and pleasant place for the old veterans to spend their declining years. Commandant Taylor, of the home, is popular and capable, and Mrs. Gibson, the matron in charge of the new hospital, is well liked and efficient.

It is a shade embowered city, as already described, and has a wealth of roses and other shrub and plant life that make the town very attractive.

Among other creditable things possessed by Roseburg is at least one surprisingly good hotel, for a town of its size. There may be others, but the Uniqua is first rate, and we are going to give Proprietor Weaver this "tag-off, gratis, because we paid regular rates, and so feel at liberty to indulge in "back talk."

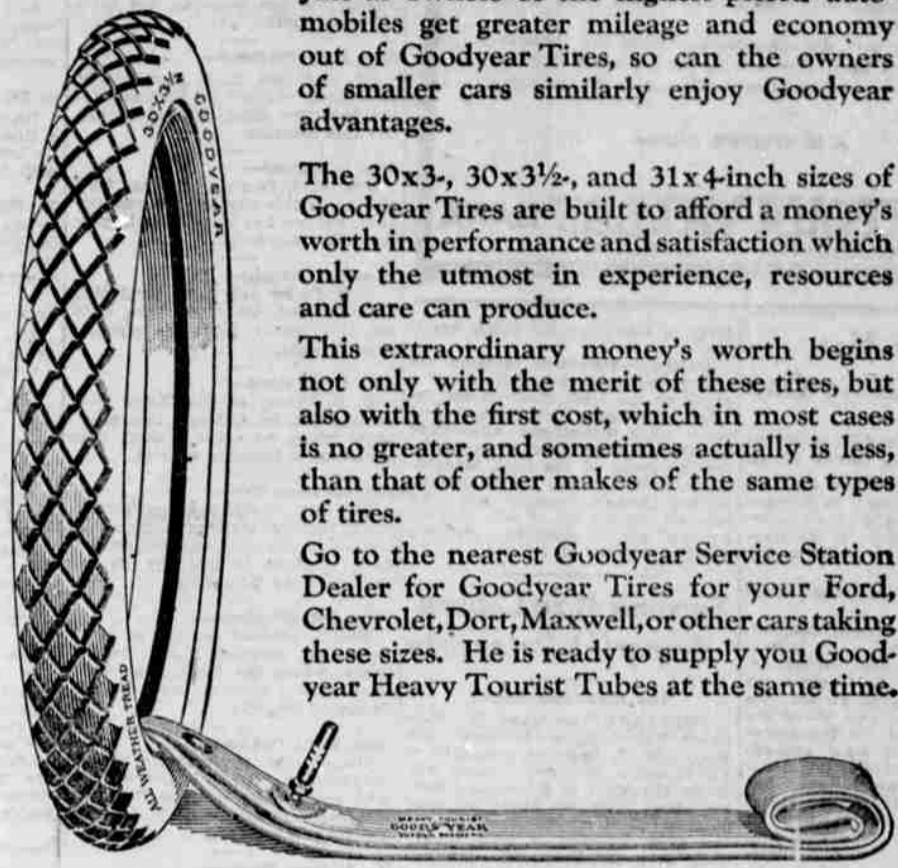

Crops and Dairy Herds In the Smith River Country Show Up Well.

WILL HAVE PUBLIC SALE

Milk Cows to be Sold at Reedsport Saturday—Lease For Garage Building Secured—Will Ship Car of Purebred Stock.

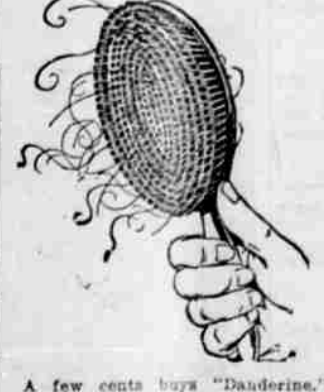
County Agent Hurd, who has just returned from a trip to Reedsport and the Smith River country, reports crops of all kinds in the western end of the county looking exceedingly well. He reports the finest crop of hay being harvested between Elkton and Reedsport that he has ever seen in the county. Some vetch and wheat in the Long Prairie district stands as high as a man's head and promises from three to four tons per acre.

The dairymen on Smith river are all enjoying a season of exceeding prosperity, due to the good prices received for butterfat and the good season for all kinds of pasture. The Smith river country is fast developing into one of the finest purebred dairy sections of the west. There is a general desire for the improvement of the dairy herds instead all through that section. During the last few months several carloads of purebreds have been shipped into Reedsport for distribution through out the territory tributary to that shipping point. Next Saturday there will be a public sale of Jerseys at Reedsport under the auspices of the Western Sales Pedigree company. There will be 25 or 30 milk cows in the sale and it is expected that good prices will be received.

Mr. Hurd made the trip to Smith river at this time for the purpose of meeting with their grange on the 26th. The meeting was a special meeting called for the purpose of making arrangements for the community fair to be held this fall. The grange has secured a ninety-nine year lease on two acres of land of

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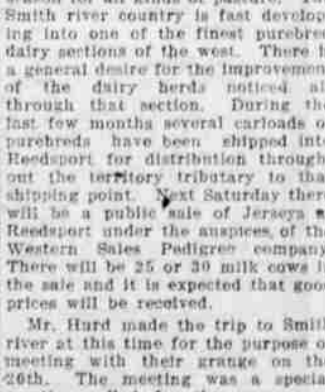
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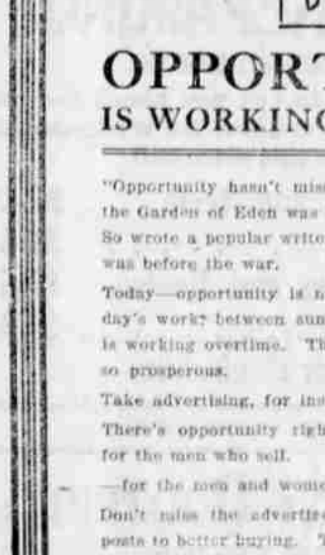
