Convention May Be Lively One

OMAHA, Neb., June 22.—One of the hottest platform battles in the history of the Democratic party is destined to take place in the San Francisco convention, in the opinion of prospective members of the resolutions committee en route to the big conclave.

Discussion revolved about these three issues:

Peace—President Wilson, demanding acceptance of his plank indorsing the Wilson covenant without essential change, will be fought tooth and nail by the Bryan faction, the Democratic senators who bolted the president and voted for the Lodge reservations and by other anti-administration elements who would not bar protective reservations, but would subordinate the league of nations issue to the party policy on the east of living, labor, trusts, profiteering and other economic questions.

Wet Fight Looms.

Liquor—there is in prospect a three-cornered contest, with Bryan demanding a "dry" plank declaring for strict observance of the eighteenth amendment and Volstead act, with the "wets" contending for a declaration in favor of light wines and beer, and with the administration and many of the practical politicians in the "wet" and "dry" camps throwing their weight in.

favor of silence on the liquor question.

Ireland—Delegates favoring the incorporation in the platform of a plank on the Irish question are divided, the New York, Illinois and some other delegations advocating an explicit expression of sympathy for the cause of the Irish independence while others would not go farther than expressing sympathy for the aspirations of all "subject nations" for independence, omitting specific mention of Ireland.

will be done this year. The state highway commission to co-operate must vote bonds and at the present low market would be unable to realize a sufficient sum on their bonds to be satisfactory.

Just what action will be taken is altogether problematical. However, Mr. Kiddle is greatly interested in the road and will be a booster for it in the future. If he does not vote for its immediate improvement he will be for it when the labor situation is so adjusted that men will be secure for both farm and road work. He is still open to conviction, however, and requested a number of maps and reports bearing statistics.
