

Gets Heavy Fine.

The heaviest penalty so far meted out in the Hawaiian Islands under the national prohibition law was that given the other day to Matsuno Tokusaku, of Hilo, in the United States district court, when the defendant was fined \$750 and sentenced to three months imprisonment. Tokusaku was charged with having had in his possession 75 gallons of *okolehao*, a native liquor still in operation, three hundred empty demijohns ready for filling
