CRIMINAL WAVE SWEEPS.

BERLIN, June 24.—The wave of criminality in Germany shows no sign of abating. Jails are filled to capacity with the thieving fraternity, and from those guilty of grand larceny down to the sneak thieves of new arrivals have to be temporarily released from custody owing to lack of room in the penitentiaries. Here are some of the principal thefts and robberies reported in the last few days.

Burglars broke into the Berlin stock exchange and forced a safe open from which they took 3,500 marks and five typewriters.

At Kreisau, the mausoleum of Field Marshal Von Moltke was broken open and the silver wreaths and crosses stolen from the sarcophagus. The field marshal's sword was found broken.

A band of armed robbers forced their way into the burgomaster's house at Pahren near Nauen, appropriated 50,000 marks belonging to the village treasury and left the burgomaster tied to a chair.

At Fallersleben near Brunswick the author of a theft from a sealed freight car was traced and several carloads of stolen goods were dis-

covered hidden. The thief was a candidate for a town councilorship. At Spandau a mortuary chamber was stripped of its loaded window panes.

In a popular Berlin suburb a woman who was shopping left her baby in a preambulator outside the store for a few minutes, the preambulator disappeared and the baby was found half naked in a doorway.

"CIRCUS" ON TOUR.

LONDON, June 25.—The Department of Overseas Trade is dispatching an official "trade circus" to tour the British dominions to advertise British goods. Those of far east, South America and the United States are positioned because manufacturers cannot work off present commitments, says the American Chamber of Commerce here.
