Stefansson at Chautauqua

Famous Explorer Comes on Second Night With His Remarkable Story of the Polar Regions.



The cardinal lecture event of the week for all Chautauquans comes on the second night when Ellison-White presents Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the famous Arctic explorer and discoverer of the "blonde Eskimo," for the first time on the Chautauqua platform.

Rear Admiral Robert E. Peary, discoverer of the North pole, said of him: "Stefansson has taken the white man's brains into the Polar regions, and has evolved a way to make himself absolutely self-sustaining. He could have lived in the Arctic fifteen and a half years, just as easily as five and a half years. By combining great natural physical ability with hard, practical common sense, he has accomplished what he has accomplished, and made an absolute record."

Stefansson's lecture has thrilled audiences everywhere. He has a remarkable story to tell and unusual ability in presenting his fascinating details graphically.

Swedish Forester To Study Methods

Axel E. F. Share, of the Royal Swedish Forest Service, is in the Northwest studying advanced logging methods, according to a message received by Forest Supervisor, W. F. Ramsdell. He is to spend several days at Rajada, in the Umpqua Forest, studying the government system in operation there. Few people know that out of Cottage Grove a short distance, the government is conducting a continuous timber sale which is being used by the entire world as a pattern for operations. Timber here is sold in sections and logged off under government supervision and a new forest is immediately started so that there will be no danger of killing the forests altogether and leaving the territory timberless—a has been done under private systems. This method of controlling the cutting off of timber has been studied in this country and abroad and although still in the experimental stage, has been so highly successful that it is being copied quite widely.

Function of an Alarm Clock.

Persons who doubt the existence of an English sense of humor should consider the following: Whether an alarm clock is a household requisite or an article of furniture caused a lengthy discussion in a British court recently, according to the Manchester Guardian. If it were found to be a "household requisite," a dealer charged with making excess profits could be convicted under the profiteering law; if it were found to be merely an article of furniture, the profiteer would go free. After much learned debate, it was decided that inasmuch as a hot water bottle, which puts one to sleep, was classed as a household requisite falling under the provisions of the profiteering act, an alarm clock, which rouses one from sleep, should logically be classed in the same category. And "the case was remitted to the magistrate to convict."

Giant Air-planes.

Airplanes of the future, required to make long overland journeys, will be specially built for this purpose, probably multiple engine, with a fuel supply capable of 24 hours or more. Indeed it is possible to build such a type of craft at the present time, flying hundreds of miles with unflinching regularity over deserts, mountains, cities and villages in all kinds of weather with an absolute freedom from danger, which is more or less prevalent in war type airplanes in use at the present time. The cost of the upkeep of an airplane and the salaries of the pilots and mechanics to keep the machine in order would soon be paid for out of the sums now given for slower rail and boat transportation, for horses, carts, pack trains, etc., necessary for desert transportation.

For those who read or do close work at night at combination eye shade and electric lamp to be worn on the forehead has been patented, the lamp being supplied with current from a socket through a cord. Light weight is a feature of an English automobile that has a frame composed of two fan trusses which carry the gear box at their apex, the engine being mounted on a vertical burkhead between the front wheels.

DEVELOP RESOURCES, STATE CHAMBER'S AIM

Expansion Movement Now in Progress Will Allow Broader Activities.

What does Oregon need? What—if it were possible to name the chief factor—does it most need in order to develop with a maximum of success?

The question is impossible to answer. There is no "chief factor." The solution lies not in one particular need, but many.

Oregon today, facing an era of development unparalleled in its history, must fill these needs if it expects to go ahead.

Of the many factors that must be employed if the state is to progress (immigration and colonization stand pre-eminent in order to solve the vital problem of land settlement.

Irrigation, reclamation of land and drainage must be developed as another method of bringing about the solution of this problem. Farm labor must be brought in. Homeseekers who in turn become food producers, must be encouraged and made to see the possibilities that await them in the great northwest.

Good roads must be built. As the vast tracts of wilderness with their billions of feet of timber are concerted into lumber, highways must be provided over which commerce can be carried and the scenic beauties of the State viewed by the tourist.

Among other needs are industrial expansion, railroad extension and water power development.

Advertising and publicity must be carried on if Oregon is to be made known as a country for the homeseeker where Opportunity beckons. Its scenic beauties must be advertised to attract the stream of golden dollars from tourists and pleasure seekers. Other states, most of them with fewer advantages to attract, are realizing millions each year from tourists—because they realize the value of advertising and making public what advantages they possess.

Oregon must develop its water transportation, its mineral lakes, its ports and reach out for foreign trade and it must develop the state to produce the exports which are to go down to the sea in ships. It must expand its educational facilities as an additional advantage to hold out to the homeseeker with children to educate.

The Oregon State Chamber of Commerce is the most logical agency to carry on this development work simply because a state organization of this nature can work for the mutual good of all communities in the state without favoring any particular one.

SEVERITY IN THIS PENANCE

Hindu Pilgrims Make Long Journeys With Most Extraordinary Method of Locomotion.

An extraordinary Indian penitential pilgrimage takes place every year, invariably on a Tuesday, usually in the first half of May. The penance consists in the Hindu penitent measuring his length on the ground from his home to the temple, often a distance of many miles.

The penitent throws himself on the ground at full length, and with a potsherd or a stone, makes a mark within reach of his fingers. Upon getting up he sets his feet on the mark, repeats the process, continuing to do this, with alternate rising and prostration, to the end of his journey.

The dress worn during the pilgrimage is exceedingly scanty, as the pilgrimage takes place during the hottest season of the year. If the journey is likely to take two or three days, the penitent may halt at night for food and rest, in which case he sets up some mark to show where he left the road, and resumes his journey from that point on the morning. Only men are permitted to perform the penance, but women and children are allowed to accompany them on foot, supplying them with food and fanning them with punkats made of palm leaves.

Upon arriving at their goal the penitents present their offerings in money or kind to the attendant priests, who utter a few words of benediction. Every few years there are deaths from exhaustion and exposure during the pilgrimage, but the enthusiasts are never deterred.—Detroit News.
