DISCUSSES PROBLEMS OF RECONSTRUCTION

Carlton Chamberlayne of New York at Chautauqua.

Carlton Chamberlayne of New York, one of the most effective public speakers of our time, brings a sane message on reconstruction problems for all true Americans in his lecture "Tomorrow" at Chautauqua on the second afternoon.

Chamberlayne is known throughout the East as one of the closest students



of national issues and of the perplexing problems of the present day. His editorial work on one of the big New York papers has given him the training for clear analysis and terse expressions. His writing and lecture work is characterized by originality, independent thinking and an overwhelming amount of good, common sense. Above all else, he is constructive in his public work.

What is the plan of the expansion movement of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce? How is it to be carried out? What is it for?

These are the three questions uppermost in the minds of the majority of those who have been informed of the movement which the State Chamber launched April 15th with a survey of the state to set up preliminary organization and establish a direct connection with practically every community in the thirty-six counties of Oregon.

The expansion movement by way of explanation might be divided into three distinct classes.

These are:

First—A survey of the state.

Second—An educational campaign to be carried on through local newspapers and by mailing literature pertaining to the movement direct to industries, firms and individuals interested in the development of the state.

Third—The intensive organization work at which time a state-wide canvass will be made, county by county, to raise a budget to enable the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce to carry on its program of development work for the state on a broader, more comprehensive scale. This canvass will be made throughout the state during June and July.

This budget is to be obtained by popular subscription. The appeal will be state-wide and to everyone interested in the development of Oregon and its particular community. It is believed the response will be met by the manufacturer, the merchant, the farmer or the individual, for each is vitally interested in seeing Oregon forge ahead and develop its advantages and resources.

Industrial developments depend on two factors: Natural resources or raw materials, and proximity to markets for manufactured products. Granted these and sufficient encouragement development inevitably follows.

Oregon has the raw materials and natural resources. It will be the purpose of the State Chamber of Commerce under its expanded program to acquaint the world with these facts, and through direct solicitation, get industrial management to consider Oregon as a site for their industries.

Furniture and wool manufacture in Oregon are in their infancy. So is the canning and preserving of fruits. With its vast resources in water power, its labor market, geographical location, Oregon offers many advantages to the manufacturer who, however, must first be interested in Oregon and know its advantages.

Alexandria Modern City.

Alexandria, founded by the world conqueror, Alexander the Great, is an Egyptian city that is eager to lose its connection with the far away past and become completely modernized. Fate favors this ambition, for the wonders that Cleopatra knew have been eaten by fire or swept away by the sea. Alexandria is a city of trade and fashion, dominated by prosperous Europeans too deeply absorbed in the stock exchange to be even vaguely interested in the romantic side of their city.

Except for a few visitors who have read a little history and are wildly inquisitive regarding Cleopatra's palace and Pompey's pillar, the ruins of Alexandria rest peacefully, unphotographed and unchipped by souvenir hunters. One thing against the popularity of Alexandria's ruins is their seariness. For the most part, they consist of a few curved stones and some "sites."

Achievement Follows Work.

A reasoning age demands respect for the person of others no matter what the sex or social station. It's folly for a man to imagine that he is strangely destined to rank above his fellows. You may be on the road to power, but that will result from fitness rather than from any endowment of divinity. The State Chamber is making a state-wide appeal for a budget of \$450,000, covering a period of three years, to carry on its development work.

The movement has been endorsed by more than two hundred leading men throughout Oregon. Eighty community executive committees have been organized to cooperate with the State Chamber in the canvass throughout the state which will be conducted during June and July.
