Designating Roads For State Fund

Charles Whitmore, of the state engineering force, who has charge of the distribution of the market road fund, arrived in Roseburg this morning to inspect some of the roads of the county and to designate those upon which the fund shall be placed. The law provides that the counties in their budget may set aside an amount equivalent to 1 per cent of the valuation. In Douglas county this amounts to \$28,000. The state will then appropriate an equal amount and this fund will be used for the improvement, development and maintenance of roads used for market purposes. The state reserves the right to designate such roads as shall be termed market roads and also assumes the responsibility for construction and improvement work. Mr. Whitmore, accompanied by the county roadmaster made a trip of inspection today and will make a report in the immediate future the roads upon which the state will expend funds.

Car Collides With Truck Near Wilbur

In a collision with a loaded road truck, J. C. Wilkins, of Seattle, was slightly bruised and his Ford car was quite badly smashed. Mr. and Mrs. Wilkins were on their way to Roseburg, and upon approaching the place where the road is being repaired, Mrs. Wilkins decided to walk. Mr. Wilkins was driving the car and collided with the truck when his machine skidded in the loose gravel. It was turned completely over, the axle being broken and considerable damage being done to other parts of the car. While it was being put back in the road a Ford bug from Sutherlin attempted to get by at high speed and made a complete somersault in the road. Damages were repaired by the Ford Garage in this city.

Modern Ranch Changes Hands

The ownership of what is said to be the most up to date and completely stocked ranch in the county, was changed today when M. Gillette of eastern Oregon, purchased the E. A. Davidson ranch on the Calapooia River, one mile east of the Calapooia bridge. The sale was closed by the Lawrence Gordon Realty company of this city. The Davidson place consists of 287 acres, 100 of which is river bottom soil. It is beautifully located, and fully stocked with live stock and implements. There are three large barns and a family orchard, and has one of the best water systems obtainable. It was formerly known as a part of the old

Winniford place, and as such is famous throughout the county. Mr. Davidson who has resided on the place for many years is in poor health, and will make his home near Sutherlin, where he has a large prune orchard. The new owner, Mr. Gillette, resided in Greens valley, near Oakland many years ago, and is not a stranger to this part of the country. He will take possession at once.

WILL TRY CASES.

District Attorney, George Neuner leaves tomorrow for Astoria, where two cases are to be tried in the justice court. One is a minor assault and battery case and the other is an action for damages in the sum of \$250 against the county. The suit is brought by S. J. Hassell, who claims that he sustained severe damages when his truck went through a bridge on one of the county roads in the vicinity of Astoria.

CHURCH MORTGAGE PAID

ALBANY, Ore., June 28—A mortgage which represented the indebtedness of the First Methodist Church of Albany, was burned Sunday forenoon at special services in the church. The ceremony marked the close of a campaign which has made the church free from debt. The mortgage was burned by John Giesendorfer, one of the oldest Methodists in the Willamette valley, who resides about five miles east of Albany, and who is the father-in-law of W. C. Hawley, representative in congress from the first Oregon district. Mr. Giesendorfer was one of the leading contributors to the fund which resulted in the ceremony.

Rev. J. C. Spencer, pastor of the church, preached the sermon of the occasion, and talks incident to the event were made by Clyde E. Williams, A. M. Hammer and J. B. Cougill.

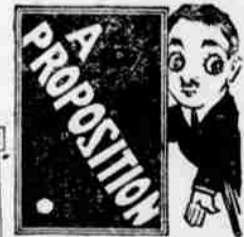
