NO GASOLINE FOR SHORT TIME TODAY

Failure of Tank Car to Arrive On Time Results In Empty Tanks About City.

TWO CARS ARE DUE

After First of Month There Will Be Practically No Danger of a Further Shortage It Is Now Stated.

A temporary shortage of gasoline existed yesterday and today due to the failure of a carload to arrive on schedule time. A tank car was shipped from Los Angeles on the 24th, but as freight schedules were upset by the Shriner specials, it failed to arrive yesterday as had been expected. As soon as it is received there will be no further shortage. The Standard station is well supplied and filling stations will be kept in position to furnish cars except at short intervals of time. Another car will be shipped from Los Angeles on the first, and it is expected that this will be the last to be brought in by the Automotive Dealers Association.

B. L. Hyland, manager of the local Standard Oil plant, has received a letter from headquarters stating that after the first of July the company will be in a position to supply all the gasoline needed. This will put an end to the shortage and will greatly relieve the situation. The local dealers will turn to the Standard Oil as soon as it is able to keep them supplied, as the cost of bringing the gas from California is altogether too high to be continued except in emergencies. The transportation and handling charges are so high that the gasoline must be sold at a very high price in order to pay expenses and consequently the dealers will handle the Standard Oil product as soon as it can be furnished. The local autoists have without doubt greatly appreciated the work of the dealers in supplying the city with gasoline. There have been practically no complaints about the high price and many drivers have been heard to say words of commendation for the association which was responsible for the relief of the shortage, which for a time threatened to completely paralyze industry.

agement, but not yet despair, in the faces of stout hearted men and women everywhere. Then this world convulsion subsided. The armistice was signed. The stupendous conflict ended. And then the nations, and the men and women within the nations began the re-organization of their affairs, and of a new world order; and began the organization of a new, a higher, and even a better civilization than the one that has so suddenly and so ruthlessly been torn apart and out of which this world disaster had issued.

"Let us choose such a man as our nominee for the first place on the ticket, and then another such man as our nominee for the second place on our ticket, and through them and through our platform, throw down the challenge to the opposing political party. With such nominees, upon such a platform we are ready for the fray."

"In behalf of the great state of South Dakota, and in pursuance of the democratic presidential primary in that state, I nominate for President of the United States, James W. Gerard, of New York. Nominate him, and America will finish the job."

Bigelow Nominates Palmer.
SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—Hailed as a "new Navarre," his lance that of law; his shield that of justice," Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer was formally nominated today for the democratic presidential candidacy by John H. Bigelow, of Hazletown, Pennsylvania.

"True Americanism must be on guard," Mr. Bigelow said. "No foe within and no enemy without must impair it or diminish it. The expenses of his campaign are met from the small and voluntary contributions of those who best. He is bound by no express or implied obligations to any class or interest. For half a century Ohio was normally republican, but three times this man has been elected governor of the Buckeye state. The last time he was the only man on the democratic ticket who was elevated and he is stronger now. I don't know if there are many in which a chief executive has made the sure and steady advance in the confidence and esteem and ripened judgment of his fellow citizens of all classes that this man has made in Ohio. His real genius for executive duty and his record of accomplishment, has increased his popularity and strength far beyond the power of our opponents to overcome, however huge the campaign fund may be."

Cummings Placed in Nomination.
SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—The name of Homer S. Cummings, chairman of the democratic national committee, was placed before the delegates of the democratic national convention today for the presidential nomination by John F. Crosby, of Connecticut, special assistant United States attorney general, who declared that the national chairman "stands four-square with that inspired genius of democracy and immortal prophet of world wide peace," Woodrow Wilson.

Chairman Cummings, said Mr. Crosby, belongs to the democracy of the nation. "For more than 20 years he has been Connecticut's official voice in the national executive council of our party." Mr. Crosby continued, "and if proof were needed to demonstrate how well he is admired and loved and trusted by his fellow democrats from every state, that proof is to be found in his unanimous election to the powerful, and all-important post of chairman of democratic national committee. Let us prove to the world that America has not forgotten. Let us nominate a man through whom the power of our country shall fulfill at last Isaiah's ancient prophecy: "Nation shall not lift up sword against nation; neither shall they learn war any longer."

"Connecticut offers such a man, a figure that rises up out of the tumult of contending desires as the one man upon whom all the factions of democracy can most happily and harmoniously unite."
