Free Love Is Advocated In Russia

The following decree has been issued by the Soviet of Vladimir, near Moscow, Russia, and shows conclusively how the bolshevism has gained control in that country. Any girl having reached her 18th year and not having married, is obliged, subject to the most severe penalty, to register at the bureau of free love at the commissariat of surveillance.

Having registered at the bureau of free love, she has the right to choose from the men between the ages of 19 and 50 a cohabitant husband.

Remarks: (1) The consent of the man in the said choice is unnecessary. (2) The man on whom such a choice falls has no right to make any protest whatsoever against the infringement.

The right to choose from a number of girls who have reached their eighteenth year is also given to men.

The opportunity to choose a wife or husband will be presented once a month.

The bureau of free love is autonomous.

Men between the ages of 19 and 50 have the right to choose from among the registered women, even without the consent of the latter, in the interests of the state.

Children who are the issue of these unions are to become the property of the state.

INDIANS CRY FOR HELP

MEXICO CITY.—Twenty million Indians, who have slaved for five cents a day for five years at a time support 3,000,000 idlers, cry out for help to the newly formed national Agrarian party, according to Chrisforo Ibanez, who made the keynote speech at the party's organization meeting here yesterday, according to El Herald De Mexico.

"Since childhood I have lived the life of peasants," said Ibanez. "I know how much the toilers of the field have suffered, how much they need and how much they merit. They have spent five years at a time earning the daily miserable wage of ten centavos (five cents) tilling the earth with the sweat of their brow for other peoples profit. In the beginning of our history as people the Indians were reduced to less than nothing by Spanish agents, who, to enslave them, incited in them the fanaticism for the Virgin of Guadalupe, so as to be able to do anything they pleased with them later, by invoking this name, and the Indians were reduced to slavery."

"For this reason the Indian hates the white man. The Indians call the animals which roam the fields the 'cahucoyote,' simply call the white man 'covote,' that is, thief. This is because for a long time there has been in Mexico 12,000 Indians who have supported 3,000,000 idlers and not a few Europeans who have lived off of them."

"Bitter attacks on General Carranza and some of his followers featured the address of the newly elected president, Antonio Soto y Gama, who said that Emil Zapata was his 'only chief.'"

Soto y Gama pleaded the party's support to the presidential candidacy of General Alvaro Obregon because of his "radicalism" and because he is feared by the reactionaries. Generals Alvaro Obregon, Salvador Alvarado, Plutarco Elias Calles Magna were elected honorary presidents of the new party.

PART OF PLANE FOUND.

ST. JOHNS, N. F., July 1.—The undercarriage which Harry Hawker dropped from his air plane when he took flight from here a year ago on his pioneer attempt to cross the Atlantic without stop, has been recovered and presented to the public museum for keeping with other exhibits associated with the colony's history. The gift was made by W. B. Grievie, M. L. C., who purchased the carriage after fishermen had picked it up off Cape Mary's, 200 miles southwest from the point where it was dropped into the sea.

When Hawker set out on his trans-oceanic attempt on May 18, 1919, he flew over the airfield of Frederick P. Rayham, almost on the edge of the coast. Within sight of his arrival, who was standing by his plane

unable to take-off because of an adverse wind. Hawker cut loose his undercarriage as a ruse to contest for the honors of the air, and to lighten his load; then winged away seaward with Ireland as his object. Rayham, accepting the challenge, thought to start notwithstanding the unfavorable conditions, but he was unable to leave the ground and his machine was wrecked, he was injured, and his navigator, Major C. W. F. Morgan, almost killed. Hawker, it will be recalled, flew 1100 miles before engine trouble brought him down.

The undercarriage was actively sought by Hawker's agents and by others as a souvenir, but search of the coast and of nearby waters, long continued, failed to disclose the wheels and their mount. Fishermen recently picked the carriage up off the coast, southwest of Cape Race and brought it into Presque, where they disposed of it for a nominal sum.

MANY TUBERCULAR SOLDIERS

PORTLAND, July 2.—Oregon is the home of 273 tubercular soldiers and 384 men were rejected by the army draft boards because of tubercular symptoms. Many soldiers "gassed" in action are developing tuberculars.

These statements were made Thursday morning to the county public health nurses at Central Library by Miss Mary E. Cronin, special nurse for soldiers and sailors, who was addressing the opening session of the Oregon Public Health Nurses conference.

Establishment of county health clinics is the goal toward which the Oregon Tubercular Association will at once start work, and the 1921 program of the association will take the first step by employing a clinician and holding clinics in different parts of the state. Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Tuberculars association told the meeting.
