naie the next president of the United States.

The entire Palmer vote added to McAdoo's total on the 38th ballot would give him 616 1/2. The Palmer vote added to the Cox total on the same ballot would give the Ohio governor 594 1/2. Both leading candidates would fall short of the two-thirds, which is 728.

**Breaks of the Balloting.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—Of the 44 ballots taken by the democratic national convention before Cox was nominated, two were taken Friday night, 14 at the first session Saturday, 22 Monday, eight of which were taken during the night session. Cox began the fight with 134 votes, climbing steadily up until the fifteenth, when he received 458 1/2. Later he lost support and dropped as low as 367 1/2.

**Cox Accepts Honor.**  
DARTON, July 6.—Governor Cox today sent a telegram to the democratic national convention at San Francisco, announcing that he would accept the presidential nomination, and thanking the delegations for the honor bestowed.
