**TAKES EXCEPTION TO "FISH STORY"**

Winchester, Ore., July 7, 1920.  
Editor Roseburg News-Review:

Dear Sir—  
I see by your paper of July 6 you claim William Burefield, at that time superintendent of the Winchester power plant, caught a 63-pound chinook on hook and line during the month of May, 1918, and that it was weighed on tested scales, and affidavits regarding its weight being signed and reported by the U. S. fish commission. You are somewhat mistaken here, for a number of people, including myself, saw this fish caught and weighed on the scales at the store at Winchester. It weighed just 53 pounds. This fish was caught by H. E. Burefield and Lloyd Tipton. I notice you have his name William Burefield, which is not correct. Mr. Burefield took this fish to Roseburg and put it on exhibition in Louis Kohlhaugen's meat market and claimed it weighed 63 pounds instead of 53, its actual weight.

The largest chinook salmon I know of being caught here on hook and line was taken by Walter Cordon several years ago. It weighed 56 pounds. I know of a number of others being caught here which weighed from 50 to 55 lbs., but there has never been a fish caught here on hook and line that weighed as high as 60 lbs. that I know of, and I have been fishing here for the last 20 years.

You also state that Rogue river has the record steelhead taken on hook and line, which weighed 14 lbs. and was caught by C. E. Duffield in August, 1911. That is only little better than the average steelhead we catch here. I have caught a large number of steelheads on hook and line that weighed from 14 to 22 lbs.

**Sheriff Has Fine Record**

Sheriff W. J. Nesbit, of Monterey county, Calif., arrived in Roseburg last night and left this morning for the southern state with Frank Mayfield, the 18-year-old car thief arrested at Oakland recently, as prisoner. Sheriff Nesbit holds an excellent record. In 1882 he was appointed deputy sheriff for Monterey county and since that time has not been out of the service of the county. For the past 25 years he has served as sheriff and has been re-elected without opposition in spite of several attempts to resign.

**Paving Starts On Washington Street**

Contractor Metzger has started the grading of Washington and Spruce streets preparatory to paving these streets with concrete. This pavement leads to the A. Rupert cannery and the Oregon Growers packing plant, and is one of the first improvements of this kind to be made for several years. The pavement will be placed as rapidly as possible and will make the buildings more easily accessible. The pavement will enable growers to drive to the buildings on paved streets and greatly facilitate loading and unloading. As the cannery company and Oregon growers own the greater portion of the land on one side of the street, there was little difficulty in securing a sufficient number of signatures for the paving, as Attorney Abraham, who owns the property on the west side of Spruce street, was also in favor of the improvement of the street.
