

Queer Accident Near Medford

A very peculiar accident near the outskirts of Medford was reported yesterday by Richard Stubbs, of Medford, who returned from a trip to Ashland. Mr. Stubbs was on his way north and had just left Ashland where he found eight cars piled in the middle of the road. According to reports the first chapter of the accident occurred at 1 P. M., when in a mixup in passing three cars were badly damaged when they collided. No one was hurt. The three cars in the mix up were the Dodge of Oman Porter, of Talent, the Chevrolet of J. D. Mara, of Ashland, and the Ford car belonging to Mrs. Larkins, of Medford.

A moment later a big Paige Jitney, enroute to Ashland, empty, and going from Medford, arrived on the scene, its driver stopping to one side of the highway opposite the wrecked cars, while he got out to look over the scene leaving the lights on.

Just as he was about to return to his car E. S. Wolgamott's Maxwell, with Mr. Wolgamott driving, in which were his sister, Miss Eva Wolgamott and Mrs. Nona Dunlap, also of Medford, and Bryant Hamilton of Applegate, enroute home from Ashland, came along and did not see the wrecked cars until the car's light shone upon them. Wolgamott, blinded from the strong rays from the Paige Jitney did not see the latter car, and in answering to one side to avoid running into the wrecked cars, ran head on into the Paige car. The Wolgamott car was totally wrecked by the collision, and the entire front of the Paige crushed. In Mrs. Dunlap suffered internal injuries, and among other cuts, one over the knee. Miss Wolgamott suffered an external fracture of the skull and cuts and bruises. The two men escaped with cuts and bruises.

The O. and C. land grant lands were thrown open today to general filing and long before the opening hour of the land office the federal building was well filled with those waiting to file. A great many applications were received throughout the day, a large number of the applicants being women. Considerable interest has been shown in these filings and a large number of residents are taking advantage of the opportunity to secure homestead lands, the majority of that left being suitable for grazing land and being filed on by adjoining land owners.

LaFollett May Split Radicals

CHICAGO, July 8.—Plans of a group of liberal radical organizations for the united third party, with candidates for president and vice-president in the field, received a setback today when single-tax members announced they would not support Senator Robert M. La Follette, who is expected to be the choice of the other groups.

The single-taxers, who arrived today to prepare for their convention, which opens Saturday, declared they would bolt the combine and nominate a separate ticket if the majority choose La Follette. While the single-taxers were threatening to present their own ticket, Amos Pinchot and George L. Record, of the committee of 48, were in Madison, Wis., today conferring with La Follette, who has received the majority of a mail straw vote of the party.

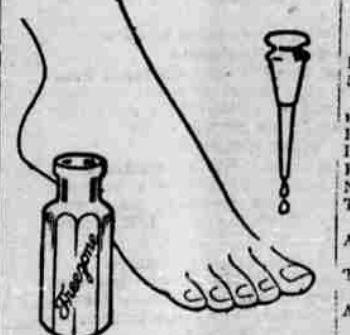
