land around the plane can be cleared sufficiently to allow it to take off. In the event the land is sufficiently level to permit this action, Mr. Ramsdell states that he has no doubt but that a clearing can be made and a runway constructed to allow the plane to fly out of its present position. It may be found necessary, however, to dismantle the machine entirely and take it out a piece at a time by pack team. If this is done it will probably be taken out by Diamond Lake, as the trail there is three more open country and more easily traveled. It might be that this latter method of procedure would be too costly and the government would decide to abandon the plane entirely, which course, however, is not apt to be followed as the planes are very costly.

The spot where the landing was made is in the heart of the Umpqua forest and in some extremely rough country. The forestry officials feel that the aviators were extremely fortunate in finding such a spot for landing, and that they escaped without injury, for landing in a DeHavilland plane is a very risky matter unless a large field is available. This occurrence impressed forcibly the need for suitable fields throughout the forests to take care of the aviators when forced landings are made.

Wheat Crop This Year Looking Up

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Wheat production this season will, according to the July forecast of the department of agriculture, be larger than expected. Statistics of crop conditions July 1 place the wheat yield this year at 809,000,000 bushels, including both winter and spring wheat. The corn yield is forecasted at 2,709,000,000 bushels. The June forecast for the entire wheat crop was 780,543,000 bushels, so that the month has brought the prospect up more than 28,000,000 bushels. The wheat crop for 1919 amounted to over 900,000,000 bushels.

PECULIAR ORDER ISSUED.

MISSOULA, Mont., July 9.—The ready made cigarette is banned and those who desire may smoke only the "makin's" in the national forest here this year. That is the ruling of the Forest Service headquarters and has been sent out to all forest workers. It is contended that the long burning "butt of a manufactured cigarette is a marked fire hazard, while the smokes of those who "roll their own" are not.
