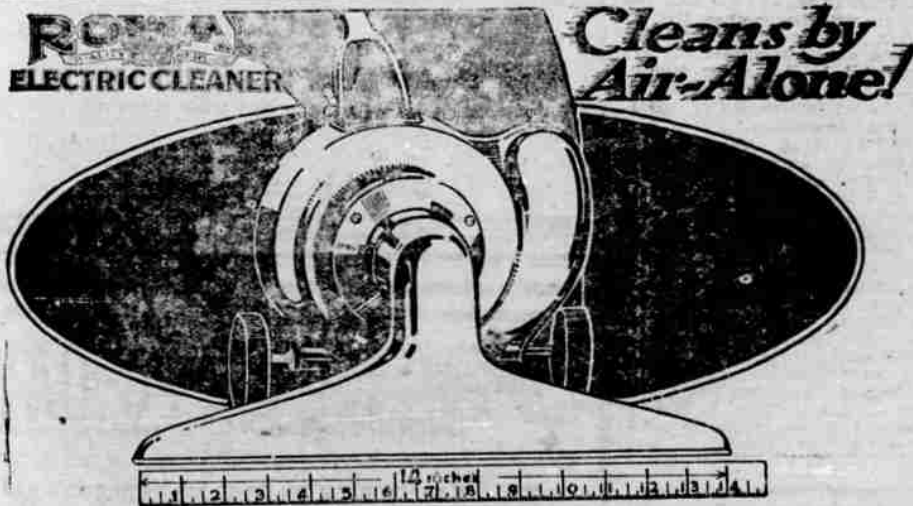

Navajos of this vicinity are dressing almost exclusively in the blankets, modeled after the Pendleton woolen units. While unsurpassed in its field as a rug, the native Navajo weave is too heavy for a body covering, and is being discarded by the red men in favor of the machine-made article. Pendleton blankets have won a reputation throughout the world. Patterns used in the blankets, modeled after the Indian design, are as distinctive as those of the Orient or ancient Egypt.

Oregon Growers Acquire Canneries

SALEM, Ore., July 9.—The Oregon Grower's Co-operative association, at a meeting of the directors held here yesterday announced the acquisition of the Sutherland cannery and fruit packing plant. The property is located in Douglas county, and in addition to being equipped for fruit drying and canning is also equipped for the manufacture of line-sugar and fruit juices.

A contract for the construction of a 24 tunnel drier at Carlton has been awarded by the association to a Portland firm, while a modern prune packing plant is to be erected at Forest Grove. At Medford the Association is rushing the work on a large packing shed adjoining the association's cold storage plant.

The packing plant at Riddle is half completed, while foundations for a similar plant at Myrtle Creek are in progress.

On Friday, July 16, the association will hold a meeting for the purpose of giving members an opportunity to inspect the plant at that place.

It was also voted by the association to hold summer meetings of the growers in the Umpqua, Rogue River and Willamette valleys.
