Prune Buying Is Almost Suspended

The prune market during the last part of this week has been very weak, with conditions exactly the reverse of former years. In other seasons buyers have vied and fought over the produce and gave some out into the orchards in a mad scramble to buy all the prunes in sight. The growers have waited for the buyers to come to them and have held out for bigger and better prices, sometimes refusing to sell until they were carried on the peak of a last rush to the highest possible market price. This year it is different. The buyers have quietly corralled the crops of the largest growers and are now sitting back contentedly and are refusing to go out into the country districts, are refusing to compete in prices, and are declining to buy prunes at any price above that at which the market opened. If a grower attempts to force things along he is told that his prunes are not wanted very badly and is directed to the next buyer. Growers this year are seeking the buyers instead of the buyers seeking the growers. The price remains unchanged and the market is practically closed. It is expected that buying will be started again soon but possibly not before the first of August. Prune men state that conditions throughout the country remain unchanged and that there is little chance for a break in the market.

100 Men Fighting Furious Dallas Fire

 DALLAS, Or., July 10.—Eight hundred men are furiously fighting a \$300,000 fire which broke out in the Willamette Valley Lumber company's sawmill here at 10 o'clock this morning, with the heat so intense that it is impossible to get within 500 yards of the blaze. Trained men for hours have risked their lives in making rushes for trainloads of logs. The cause of the fire is unknown. Nearly three million feet of logs are endangered by the conflagration and every effort is being made to save the loading docks and the planing mill, which is also in danger of complete destruction. Over 150 men will be thrown out of employment as a result of the fire.
