PEST DOES VERY LITTLE HARM TO STRAWBERRIES
EUGENE, July 15.—Only five small patches of strawberries in Lane county and one in Douglas county just over the line, have been found to be infected with nematodes, the insect that plays havoc with all kinds of crops, according to C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, who returned from a second trip to the lower Siskiyou country to ascertain the extent of the spread of the pest. One of these patches is in the town of Florence, Mr. Stewart said, but he found no more on the north side of the river.

"I don't think there will be much difficulty in getting rid of the pest," said the inspector. "The men who own the small patches of strawberries that are infected are perfectly willing to destroy the vines, and by this method I think we will be able to get rid of the insects." Mr. Stewart said he found only one clover patch that was infected.
