CHAUTAQUA TENT IS GOING UP TODAY

Court House Grounds Presents Busy Scene Where Brown Canvas Is Spread.

PROGRAMS ARE FINE

Press From All Over the Country Give Flattering Reports of the Attractions Offered This Year—Sent Sale Good.

Chautauqua—Roseburg's annual good time week—commences Saturday night. The big brown tent arrived on the morning train and will be pitched today on the Court House grounds. The program this year includes "Kindling," ten lectures and ten concerts.

Judging from press reports from California, Utah and Idaho cities, where the Chautauqua has already appeared, the program this year far surpasses anything of previous years. Especially commendable are the constructive and educational lectures. Among the lecturers who will talk upon the problems of unrest and on economic problems, are Judge Fred G. Bale, of Columbus, Ohio, of juvenile court fame, Carlton Chamberlayne, editor and lecturer of New York; Judge J. D. Alden, one of America's foremost platform orators from Massachusetts, and E. B. Fish of Washington.

Fish will speak Sunday night. He recently came from the ranks of labor, having been a machinist in the Everett, Washington, shipyards at the time of the general strike in Seattle. He left his job to go out and appeal to his fellow workmen in the northwest to down the Bolsheviks, and stand by Uncle Sam, and for the past year has been speaking to the thousands of laboring men in the factories, camps and mills. He will talk here upon the "Cause and Cure of Industrial Unrest," on which subject he has just finished a book. He is also editor of the Labor and Industrial Journal, a labor paper of 100 per cent Americanism, published in Seattle.

In addition to constructive lectures on present day problems, the Chautauqua is offering this year a group of three educational lectures. One is by Dr. G. Whitefield Ray, F. R. G. S., and is an exploration story of South America. Another is an oriental pageant lecture by Julius Caesar Naphys. Displaying many priceless oriental tapestries and costumes he presents one of the most unique and informative programs on the platform. The third lecturer of this group is by Lela M. Blomfield, of New Zealand, who with a native Maori company gives us an insight to the lives and customs of her people.

Among the outstanding musical features is Paul Pierria and his string quintet. Mr. Pierria was formerly violinist and composer to the late Court of Portugal. Another musical feature is the Royal Welsh Lullies Singers, a noted Welsh ladies' choir from Wales, Great Britain, under the direction of Madame Hughes Thomas. The Metropolitan press and musical critics in the east have been especially loud in their praise of this splendid musical organization.

An innovation at Chautauqua this year is the play "Kindling," a Broadway success, admirably presented by the Maurice Browne Players.

The Roseburg Chautauqua Association reports the advance sale of season tickets as progressing very satisfactorily, and from the present indications this year's Chautauqua promises to surpass the Chautauqua of former years, both in attendance and excellence of program offered. Season tickets are on sale at the drug stores and banks.

Those who signed for tickets are urged by the committee to call and get their tickets as early as possible, as the ticket sales closes promptly as soon as the ticket guarantee is reached.
