Slight Increase In Rates Made

The commission criticizes the company for failing to provide figures on normal reproduction costs, and for substituting in lieu thereof figures based on the present high costs. It rules out the South Empress plant, which is only of little use and on which the company is allowed rental in the sum of \$25 per month. The order also deals with the funded debt, the amount of stock issued and water rights, all of these matters being taken into consideration in dealing with the application. The water pumped by the south plant is condemned for use except for emergency fire purposes and the plant is excluded from the operating property.

The figures of the company's engineer and the commission engineer are greatly at variance on both the electric and the water utilities. The depreciation values are also taken into consideration and are covered in the order. One of the interesting parts of the annual income for the past seven years, which shows a slight decrease in income for the last two years.

Hydrants Are Charged. The commission claims for itself the right to set aside rates on hydrants provided by franchisees and quotes the supreme court case of the city of Hillsboro against the public service commission. As a consequence it sets aside the agreement between the company and the city and places a rental basis on all hydrants and standpipes, and substitutes the following:

Private connection with sealed pipes, or thermal automatic opening. Per Month 1 1/2 inch or less \$1.50 2 inch 2.00 3 inch 2.50 4 inch 3.00 Municipal Service—First 65 hydrants or less \$275 Each additional hydrant on future extension of main 2 Each additional hydrant on main now existing, per hydrant 50c The hydrant as specified in the above rate will consist of at least two standard openings for fire hose (or larger equivalent opening for pumping engine). Two inch stand pipes with single hose connections will be considered as equivalent to 1/2 hydrant.

The commission ends its report with a lengthy explanation of the need of increased rates. The Roseburg price rates are stated to be lower than those in almost any other city and the increase granted, the commission states, does not give the company the amount of money needed for like service in other cities and towns.
