## CHAUTAQUA OPENS WITH GOOD PROGRAM

Large Crowd in Attendance At Entertainments Which Are Considered Fine.

### LECTURERS EXCELLENT

Musical Numbers This Year Are Very Good. While Prominent Lecturers Are to Be Heard on the Platform.

With the huge tent crowded to capacity, the Chautauqua opened Saturday night with the Oriental pageant by Julius Caesar Nayphe. Mr. Nayphe has in hand a large fund of old stories which he tells well and in the right place. He is smart enough to realize that the old stories are the ones that are necessary to a Chautauqua audience if the point is to get over unanimously and in proper time.

He tells an interesting story of Oriental life customs, makes more understandable a lot of phrases in biblical lore and illustrates some of the peculiarities of the country in pageantry.

The costumes and draperies exhibited by Mr. Nayphe were said to be a part of the famous collection at the St. Louis exposition. They were very beautiful and attracted a great deal of attention and admiration.

Mr. Nayphe got in good with his American audience when he told of his foreign experience and how he came to this country because of its greater opportunities and greater freedom, giving up home, relatives, royalty and "a family tomb" that he might enjoy the priceless liberties of the United States. The Reds in session at Chicago who call themselves "liberals" and "progressives" ought to hear Mr. Nayphe's apostrophe to America.

Yesterday's program included two good lecturers. Carlton Chamberlayne with his lecture on "Tomorrow" was good, his talk winning a great deal of applause from the audience. Mr. Chamberlayne is well known on the Chautauqua circuit.

He is a lecturer and editor and in his talk predicts the gradual settlement of the unrest which is now stirring the country. At present he holds that America is actually in greater danger than during the war period, but is optimistic in the view that these problems will be eventually solved. He declares that the world entered a new era upon the signing of the armistice on November 11, 1918, which will be as distinct in history as that which opened the Christian era over 1900 years ago.

The evening lecture by E. B. Fish was one of the finest ever heard in Roseburg.

Preceding each lecture was a concert by the Alaska Duo that took well with the audience. There was no pretense on the part of the company to artistry. They had their heart to play and they played it well without any kush. Their voices blend perfectly in their duet work and Miss Laeka sings with an ease and a clarity of tone that prevents an audience from getting uncomfortable for fear she isn't going to make it.

This afternoon the prelude was given by Paul Pereira and his string quintet, and the reading of "The Music Master" by Capt. Katchell. Tonight the program includes the quintet and the return engagement of Mary Adel Hayes, the noted soprano, whose ability is held in high esteem here.

## Goodly Crowd Sees The Roundup Show

The roundup show at the fair grounds Saturday did not draw a very big crowd, owing to shortness of time in advertising the attraction, but Sunday afternoon several hundred people congregated in the old grandstand and along the track to witness the feats of riding and the races. Shortly after 2 o'clock the show opened with a relay race, and from that time until after 4 o'clock the features of the roundup were pulled off as rapidly as possible.

There were no long waits, and as fast as one horse was disposed of another was brought in and saddled for the sport. There is no question but what the roundup people have the horses, and some of them are star performers in their line. There may have been a little criticism of the riders or horses in some quarters, but anyone who has seen a bunch grass bronco in action on his native heath was pretty well satisfied with the exhibition these riders put up.

The fellow who thought it an easy matter to ride any of the horses, has a standing invitation to ride 'em, the managers say. So far, however, there has been no acceptance of the invitation. Saturday afternoon a young girl with the roundup assayed to ride a vicious horse, and was thrown. She was all western grit, however. The horse was caught and brought back and the girl remounted. She rode him to a finish, and old rance riders who saw the feat allege that the girl was a splendid and fearless rider, and although the horse made some wicked plunges, the young lady stuck to the saddle like a veteran.

To the credit of the horses brought into the ring yesterday it may be said that only two or three of the riders were able to stick. The majority of them were slick in short order. One youngster attempting to ride a powerful black horse was thrown so high that the spectators began to think he was enroute to meet the airplane that was leaving a field a little to the north, but the earth attraction was greatest, so the lad finally got back. The trip from the hurricane deck of the horse was not so bad, but the landing was somewhat sudden, the lad seemed to think, because it took a half minute for him to find out just where he was.

The men in charge of the roundup are old range riders and know the game well. Most of the riders are youngsters who have been brought up on the cattle ranges east of the mountains, and they are typical of the early day riders and plumb full of genuine western good-fellowship. The roundup carries more than 50 horses, and in addition to their ranc horses has some excellent saddle animals. They came from Klamath and are enroute north.

### EX-KAISER'S SON SUICIDES.

BERLIN, July 18.—Prince Joachim of Hohenzollern, youngest son of ex-Emperor William, committed suicide today in Potsdam.

Joachim was believed to have been in financial straits. He recently was divorced.

Prince Etel, questioned as to the motive for his brother's suicide, declined to make any statement.

The body was transferred to Potsdam chapel today. Prince Joachim was the least talented of the emperor's sons. He held the rank of captain, but according to statements, he has never actively been at the front. He leaves one son.

Later advices say Prince Joachim shot himself Saturday while in his residence at Potsdam. He recently had been suffering from great mental depression.

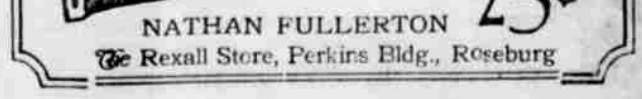
