Work to Start on Cut-Off Road Soon PORTLAND, July 22.—Work of grading and rocking the section of the Pacific highway between Myrtle Creek and Canyonville will be started this year. This work has been held up by the Riddle case, which was reversed by the supreme court Tuesday. In this case the state highway commission was brought into court because it ran the highway on a straight course from Myrtle Creek to Canyonville instead of going to Riddle. The straight route saved three miles.

"The supreme court decision," said S. Benson, chairman of the commission, yesterday, "is exactly what we expected it would be. The decision simply confirms the understanding which the commission had of the law."

Commissioners Booth and Kiddle expressed themselves similarly. The commission, with the supreme court decision back of it, can now proceed with the Myrtle Creek-Canyonville section, which is 9.8 miles in length. The contract for grading this section had been awarded by the commission when the contractor was enjoined and the Riddle case

Through efforts of the state Fish and Game Commission, the biological survey, Bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture will make an exhaustive investigation in regard to damage done by robins in Oregon according to information received by the commission Monday.

TO INVESTIGATE ROBINS

The communication is from W. C. Henderson, acting chief of bureau, who says that Ray C. Steels, United States Game Warden has been appointed to make the survey.

Investigations in New York state last year resulted in the growers being allowed to kill the robins to protect their crops.

"From all information robins have greatly increased, and despite their general usefulness as a destroyer of injurious insects, depredations have been committed throughout most of the northern states that demand attention," says Henderson.

Henderson says that the investigation will be conducted this summer, so that proper action can be taken for next season.
