Sunday Outing at Tiller Enjoyable

For those residents of Roseburg who enjoy spending Sunday in the country, there is no better place than the little town of Tiller, located at the southern end of the county, some 54 miles from Roseburg. The road to Tiller offers all the advantages of a pleasant Sunday drive, about three hours being required to make the trip. The road is in good condition all of the way. The slight roughness from Perdue to Tiller is more than offset by the beauty of that portion, with the road winding along through country, the scenic grandeur of which has not been despoiled by human hand. Tiller, itself is a picturesque little town as can be imagined, and last but not least of the good points of the outing, is the chicken dinner served on Sundays at the Tiller Hotel by the proprietor, Ed. Renfro. A home cooked chicken dinner with vegetables of every kind cooked "just right" is Mr. Renfro's specialty, and the dinner is served on a screened porch. To occupy the afternoon, a green, shady lawn with large trees and easy chairs is offered and a short walk to the pine grove in which the dance hall is located, and down a shady trail to the mineral springs. The mineral springs water is ice cold, and is composed of lithia and sulphur. No better Sunday trip could be conceived than this, and promises to be even better if the plans which Mr. Renfro has made come to pass. He is planning to rebuild the hotel when the Tiller cut-off becomes a reality, and include a deer park, high pond and mineral water fountain in the list of attractions.
