Roseburg Advances In Bank Standing

SALEM, Ore., July 28.—Total deposits in the banks of the state of Oregon on June 30, 1920, aggregated \$280,275,842.22, a decrease of \$6,293,150.62 since May 4, 1920, but an increase of \$41,029,835.25 since June 30, 1919, according to a report prepared by Will H. Bennett, state superintendent of banks, here today.

Portland deposits, according to the report, increased \$2,548,332.63 since May 4, 1920. The first 12 cities in the list remain the same as on May 4, while Roseburg, McMinnville, Tillamook and Ashland have each moved up two places, while Lebanon advanced four.

Woodburn appears as a million-dollar city for the first time, while Enterprise, Clifton and Dallas failed to qualify. There are now 34 million-dollar towns in Oregon, as compared with 36 at the time the report of the bank superintendent was issued on May 4, 1920.
