Move Started to Save Scenic Roads

Unless immediate steps are taken to arouse public sentiment to the necessity of preserving the standing timber along our highways, Oregon is doomed to be stripped of one of her greatest treasures, says the Oregon Motorist. In a few short years, unless some plan or means is devised whereby the devastating hand of man can be stayed, the majestic trees now shading the roads and nothing but hideous naked stumps will remain to mock the eye. Already the scenic beauty of some of our grandest highways has been sacrificed to satisfy the cold blooded greed of commercialism. For the good of the state, some concerted effort should be made to prevent further ravages of this kind.

It is not that we would deny man the right to mill the uncountable millions of feet of standing timber within the borders of our wonderful state; it would be folly to conceive such a thought. Although there are many of us who doubt that the Almighty intended that His Handiwork should be so destroyed, we have been brought to believe that the commercial necessity of the age requires that our forests be sacrificed. In Oregon, we have come to look upon the lumber industry as being one of the states greatest assets, which in truth it is.

But Oregon has assets other than the lumber industry, one of the greatest of which is the natural scenic grandeur with which it is endowed. To profit from the former asset, it is necessary that our standing timber be destroyed, to benefit from the latter, it is necessary that a part of the timber be preserved. The former is a temporary asset, and the latter can be made a permanent one.

Russian Children Being Sent Home

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 31—Red cross workers here are preparing for the arrival early next week of nearly 800 Russian children enroute from Vladivostok to Petrograd, where, it is hoped, they may be returned to their parents or relatives.

When the revolution moved toward its height in Russia many fathers and mothers of Petrograd gathered their children into groups of twenty to a hundred, and with nurses and teachers sent them into the peaceful, rich areas of Siberia. "For a few months until the trouble has blown over."

Time came for the little wanderers to return to their parents. But in the meantime a barrier of fire had risen between them; a dead line formed of the entire battle fronts of armies. When hunger and war terrors confronted the little wanderers, the American Red Cross took over group after group, established colonies in Western Siberia, and apparently solved the problem of feeding and housing its young charges. But as the battle line waned and the Bolsheviks captured town after town, where American Red Cross activities were in operation, the children were moved away. These they were taken to Russian Island. Here they were given the best of care until they left on the steamer Yonel Maru for San Francisco.

The colony had a dental clinic, a hospital and a primary school. Thirteen of the larger girls took a course of training fitting themselves to become nurses aides in the American Red Cross Hospital. Some of the children included in the group have exceptional qualities of temperament and ability. Several have fine voices. One little girl whose mother is a professional dancer, has a remarkable gift for the stage. Still another paints beautifully. The genius for mechanics possessed by many of the boys is shown in their toys, whittled out of bits of wood with whatever sharp edged tool they can find.
