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**Prisoner Escapes
Guard at Drain**

Private Marion F. Emery, a federal prisoner on the way to Bremerton, Wash., from San Diego, Calif., in charge of Sergeant Iva Cartwright, escaped from train No. 14 as it was leaving Drain today, but was later captured near Yoncalla about 5 p.m. The Sgt. commandeered an automobile in which Dr. Cartfield and his father were riding, and they proceeded south on the highway, as it was reported that a soldier was seen riding in that direction on the railroad track.

As they neared Yoncalla the prisoner was seen in the roadway. The Sergeant concealed himself in the tonneau of the auto until it was abreast the man, when he showed himself and spoke to him. When the prisoner recognized the Sergeant he jumped behind the car and ran a zig-zag course down the road. The Sgt. drew his gun and ordered him to stop, but he didn't; then he fired at him, but the prisoner ran all the faster. With a careful aim the second shot took effect and he fell.

Upon reaching the wounded man it was discovered that the bullet had pierced the sole of his right shoe, entered the bottom of his foot and had lodged in his leg below the knee joint. He was put in the car and brought to Drain where the bullet was removed and the wound dressed at Dr. Cartfield's office.

Aside from being badly frightened and losing considerable blood, the prisoner is resting easy and the Sergeant expects to proceed north with his on the night train.
