VETERAN BURIED TODAY

Captain James C. Gipson, aged 83 years, a native of Wisconsin, was buried at the Soldiers Home cemetery this morning. Rev. C. H. Hilton conducting the service. Captain Gipson bears a remarkable record for war service. Entering the naval service as an apprentice at the age of 18 years, he was three times promoted for gallant and meritorious conduct. Serving with Farragut throughout the Mississippi campaign, he was one of the officers aboard the Cardonolletto when that vessel led the fleet in the run of the blockade at island number 10. He was commander of the vessel at the siege of Vicksburg. He came to Portland about six years ago and about two years ago took up his abode at the Soldiers Home. Soon after his arrival in this city his wife, who accompanied him, died. He is survived by a brother, A. E. Gipson, of Caldwell, Idaho, who came to this city Saturday, having learned of his brother's serious illness through a telegram sent by Commandant Taylor. He is also survived by a sister who resides in Wisconsin.

GAS ARRIVES SUNDAY

The gasoline situation was greatly relieved today as the result of the arrival of a tank car containing 10,000 gallons of gasoline sent from the Willbridge Standard Oil station. This car was unexpected and was sent out because of the emergency here. Mr. Hyland ordered a distribution to local filling stations and sent out the major portion of the remainder to nearby towns, where it is to be distributed to trucks and tractors only. At the present time essentials are being given 100 per cent, while 10 per cent is given pleasure cars. Mr. Hyland states that the 10,000 gallons will serve the city and community for about two days and by the time it is exhausted another car shipped from Wyoming is expected to be here. There are five cars on the way to the local plant and with their arrival there will be no danger of being forced to shut down on any of the important industries. It is expected that a ratio of 100 per cent for essentials and 50 per cent for pleasure cars will be observed until after the middle of September.
