War Veterans to Meet in Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 13.—Probably the most notable gathering of army leaders since the disintegration of the great allied military machine in France, is expected to assemble here for the American Legion convention September 27, 28 and 29. Preparations are being made to entertain anywhere from 30,000 to 50,000 veterans of the world war.

Among the famous military men expected by the committee on arrangements are General Pershing and most of the members of his staff; Marshals Foch and Petain and members of their staffs; several British and Canadian officers of high rank and officers from other of the allied countries. Viscount Beatty, Admiral Sims, Secretary of War Baker, Secretary of the Navy Daniels, Franklin D'Oller, commander of the American Legion and Col. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., are scheduled for leading parts in the gathering.
