Convict Makes A Dash For Freedom

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 17.—With three mail order catalogues strapped around his body to protect him from bullets, George F. Davis, 23 years old, made a dash for liberty at Folsom prison this afternoon, only to be shot and killed when he was two-thirds of the distance across the American river.

At one time he had been an inmate of a reform school in Oregon, from which he escaped last year. Davis was working with a gang of other convicts in the granite quarry. Suddenly, when he thought the attention of the guards was turned, he started toward the river in a wild dash for freedom.

Through the two lines of guards he swiftly ran while bullets whistled around him. A fusillade followed and he jumped into the river and started for the other shore. On and on Davis went, seemingly safe from the lead showered around him. When nearing the other shore, however, a bullet struck him in the heart. He was seen to throw up his hands and then disappear.

Davis was committed to the penitentiary from San Bernardino April 15, after being sentenced to 15 years on a burglary charge.

Have Some Fine Seed—Emmitt Hall and M. H. The seed was placed on display in the windows of the Lawrence-Cordon realty company. The growers claim the seed will produce excellent hay and will constitute a fine crop of forage. It will grow exceptionally fine in wet ground, the gentlemen stated.

1200 TO 1400 ACRES SWEPT. MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 17.—It was thought tonight that the forest fire which had been burning since last Friday upon the Siskiyou is now under control. State District Fire Warden Eberle and a force have been fighting it. The fires already has burned over 1200 to 1400 acres in scattering timber land and some of it includes holdings of the Hill Lumber company. The fire was first discovered by the air patrol after it had burned over 100 acres.

EARLY PICKED PEARS INFERIOR. Early picked pears are decidedly inferior in quality to those harvested later, says the O. A. C. Experiment station. Pears picked from the middle to the end of the season likewise keep slightly longer in cold storage than the early picked fruit. Growers can get the pear harvesting and storage bulletin by writing to the college at Corvallis.

Prentiss, instructor in household science at the O. A. C. The little busy bee is one producer not contaminated with the strike germ, and no profiteer has cornered the honey market. By using at least the part of the home-made honey crop not in marketable condition, the big item of sugar cost can be almost, or altogether eliminated from the monthly bill. The college has prepared a number of receipts for use of honey as sugar substitute.
