Southern Democrats Vote Down Suffrage

RALEIGH, Aug. 19.—The federal equal suffrage amendment went down to defeat in the North Carolina house of representatives today by a vote of 71 to 41.

According to information brought here today, two girls, 18 and 19 years of age, were found last night in a road camp in the Camas Valley section. The girls had walked into the camp carrying their suitcases and stated that their car had been left on the other side of the mountain with a broken axle. They demanded that they be allowed to remain at the camp over night, but the road crew insisted that they continue their journey to Roseburg and the tourist car and arrived here early this morning. 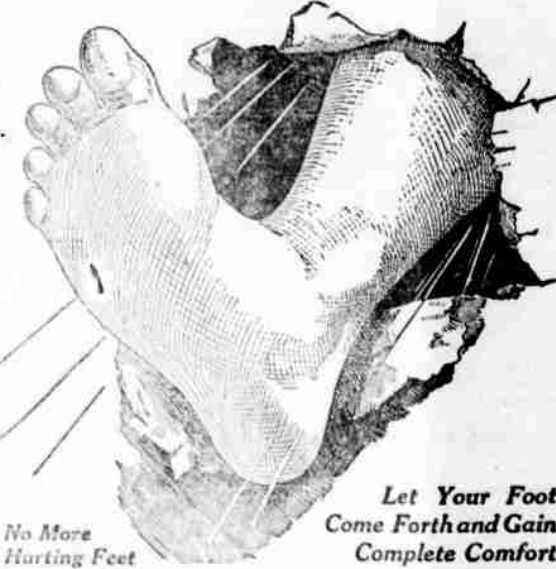

MEANACE TO OUR FRUIT INDUSTRY.

(Continued from Page 1) too much is applied, there will be a tendency for the excess to run down to the lowermost part of the fruit and leave a somewhat heavier deposit there, which might necessitate wiping the fruit. Chemical tests have shown that even when apples are very heavily coated with lead arsenate in spraying it would be impossible for a person to eat enough of them at one time to get any noticeable ill effects. Nevertheless, it is to the advantage of all concerned (except Mr. Worm), to adopt the methods described and get an inconspicuous, but perfect spray covering on the fruit. (Signed) W. S.
