Active organization work of the Non-Partisan league in Oregon will begin immediately following the general election this fall, according to a recent decision of the national executive committee of the league as outlined in letters sent to persons in Oregon who are believed to be in sympathy with the movement.

Though an underground campaign of organization has been dis-

cernible in this state during the past few months through the agency of Non-Partisan organizers in the guise of phonograph salesmen, insurance agents, etc. in the rural districts, nothing has yet been done in the open.

ELECTION SUIT NEAR END.

REEDSPORT, Or., Aug. 20.—Judge Hamilton, of the circuit court of Douglas county, gave a decision in

the Weatherly versus Johnson case, annulling the demurrer of the defendant's answer regarding the matter of Johnson's election.

This it is believed will virtually settle the case in favor of the legality of Johnson's election. Mr. Weatherly brought an ouster proceeding against Johnson as port commissioner of the Port of Umpqua, which was followed by an injunction proceeding by W. H. Jewett, a resident of Gardiner. The injunction proceeding was dismissed.
