WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—Justice Sissons of the District of Columbia supreme court, this afternoon denied the application of anti-suffrage leaders for a restraining order to prevent promulgation of the federal suffrage amendment by the state department. Issuance of a temporary injunction, Justice Sissons said, would be an unwarranted interference with a purely administrative act of the secretary of state.
