

PRINCES TO GO TO WORK, CAN'T LIVE ON \$30,000.

LONDON, Eng., Aug. 26. — Because the high cost of living has made the \$30,000 annual allowance to each of the sons of King George inadequate the King has suspended the rule forbidding members of the family to engage in business. One of the Princes declined a magnificent offer from a large financial house in 1914 because of the rule. It is understood the offer has been renewed.

A NEW CROP OF MILLIONAIRES.

An analysis of the federal income tax returns for 1919 shows that in that year 20,000 persons paid taxes as millionaires, as compared with about 16,000 in 1917. Indianapolis Will Entertain G. A. R.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 25.—After a lapse of 27 years Indianapolis will again entertain the annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic. For the first time since 1893 the national meeting of the Grand Army will be held this year in the Hoosier capital, September 13 to 25.

Civic committees are now planning to entertain 100,000 visitors during the week of the encampment. A list of houses which will accommodate one or more of the civil war heroes is being compiled and committee members say comfortable quarters will be available for everyone.

Numerous entertainment features are being prepared. There will be airplane rides for veterans who may retain some of their wartime courage. Automobile trips have been arranged for others.

Hotel headquarters have been assigned to the 33 state departments of the G. A. R. Arrangements for the gathering are being made by a committee of 800 business men who are working under the direction of an executive committee of five members.

IF WE HAD GONE ON TO BERLIN.

If Russia with its 180,000,000 people and its vast resources in raw materials can break through Poland, or break down that country and unite with Germany, we shall face the great danger which far-seeing men during the whole of the European war realized might come about. With the military spirit of Germany still alive and unconquered, dominating in leadership the 180,000,000 people of Russia, there would be potentialities for evil that may well make the world shudder. When the allied and American

armies failed to take possession of Berlin, Vienna and Constantinople, the most stupendous blunder in human history was made, and to that failure is due the imminence of the dangers which we now face. If the armies of the allies and of America had held full possession of Berlin, Vienna and Constantinople there would have been no possible way for the spirit of bolshevism to spread and the danger which threatens the world under conditions now existing would have been avoided.

American troops, knowing that they had the Huns on the run, wept when they received word of the armistice, and this we have from men who were engaged in the struggle on the battlefield. They realized that a tremendous blunder was being made and the world will yet have to face a loss in men and money infinitely greater than would have been the cost in lives and treasure if we had gone "on to Berlin!"—Manufacturers' Record.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—The American Expeditionary Forces will pass into history August 31, when the only remaining unit of the army that fought in France, A. E. F. headquarters in Washington, ceases to exist.
