"Porker" is Held In County Jail

Frank Dayton, alias A. B. Mattison, is being held in the county jail following his arrest in connection with the recent sale of picnic hams in this city. Dayton is one of the party which is composed of two men and two women, the other man being known by the name of H. Cooper. The soliciting is done by the women, who represent the meat to be home cured ham of the best variety. The delivery is made by Cooper, whose scales are two pounds off weight. Dayton takes care of the shipments from San Francisco and was arrested this morning as he took possession of two crates shipped from San Francisco containing 500 pounds of the shoulders which are being sold as ham. The women and men represent the shoulders to be hams and sell them at a price over that of the regular market and at the same time deliver short weight. Dayton refuses to divulge the present location of the remainder of the party. It is believed that a camp has been established somewhere near this city and a search is being conducted for the remainder of the quartette. The complaints received from those who were "stung" continue to pile up in the local police offices.
