HIGH SCHOOL REGISTRATION. All persons desiring to enter Roseburg High School this fall will be required to register at the principal's office the week before schools open. Seniors will register Monday, Sept. 6, Juniors Tuesday, 7th, Sophomores Wednesday 8th, hours 1 to 5 p. m. and 7 to 9 p. m. Freshmen will register all day Thursday and Friday forenoon. Classes begin September 13. All students should register before the above date, whether they intend to be in school the first two weeks or not.
