HORSES IN DEMAND.

Hunting Season Opens Wednesday

With the opening of the deer season scheduled for Wednesday, the woods are liberally sprinkled with camps where the would-be deer slayers are preparing to bag their limit.

The city is wearing a rather deserted appearance for hundreds of its residents have departed with their camping outfits to be on the ground when the season opens. Many others are preparing to leave the city tomorrow, while today saw a general exodus of residents all armed as if for hostile encounter with a belligerent enemy.

More people are going to the national forest than ever before. The Cow creek canyon district is also greatly favored by many hunters. In fact nearly every wooded section of the county bears its quota of hunters. Those whose business carries them into the mountain districts state that never before have deer been seen as frequently as during the past few months, and it is believed that a great majority of the hunters will be successful in their quest. As usual, warnings for caution are being voiced. With such a great number of hunters, many of them amateurs, in the woods there is a great deal of danger and extreme caution is urged in order to prevent accidents. The season opens on Wednesday, and this year the hunters have been very fortunate in having had a rain which was quite general over the entire county and which so wet the woods that hunting will be made much easier and at the same time the danger from forest fires will be greatly lessened.
