LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

HOW TO FINANCE BOND ISSUE FOR THE WATER SYSTEM

An open letter to the Hon. Mayor and City Council:

I understand from a talk with Mayor Hamilton that there are three obstacles in the way of building a municipal light and water plant: viz. high priced and scarce labor and high priced materials and high interest rates. I believe the first two will gradually adjust themselves and this letter will endeavor to solve the third. This is the first obstacle that must be removed, as I understand that the ordinance so recently voted on provides that the project cannot be consummated unless 5 per cent money can be secured.

Here is my plan to get 5 per cent money and at the same time be of real benefit to the many citizens of Roseburg. First, bonds must be provided in denominations of \$100, \$500 and \$1,000 to draw 5 percent interest and where desired to be paid in easy installments, say 5 per cent of the total each month. Thus the humblest citizen could buy a hundred dollar bond for \$5 down and \$5 per month and have it paid for in a little more than a year and a half and many could easily pay \$25 per month by being a little saving in and nineteen months have a \$500 bond paid for. This would provide money as the city needed it for construction work. In that way the plant would indeed belong to the people.

Second, a big drive should be carefully and systematically organized and bonds sold much the same way that the Liberty bonds were sold. Surely it would be a patriotic service to buy these bonds and thus insure the building of a plant that would be of great benefit to the community.
