Let the Public Be the Judge

If it were not for the ethics involved in business principles on which we have very good reason to pride ourselves for at least being sane, we would take up word for word and prove the utter fallacy of the ridiculous and absurd statements as made in the scurrilous announcement, apparently directed at us and published in The News-Review of yesterday by the management of the Liberty Theater.

This bitter onslaught is wholly unwarranted and bespeaks that of a disturbed mind, for in our published announcement of Sept. 5th, from which they were probably stunned by the magnitude of our lineup, we made no reference nor insinuation as to any opposition, but simply made a clean statement of true facts concerning our own business and the policy as adopted at the annual meeting of the board of directors held early in July.

However, there is one point of the article in question which we deem it our duty to bring out as a bit of exalted egotism so that the public may be the judge and forever brand such malicious methods as being absolutely devoid of truth and principle. That is the following quotation from their announcement: "We are charmed indeed to know that since we entered the field the opposition has decided to give to Roseburg shows to which this city is entitled, and I believe the people of this city owe us much gratitude for forcing these gentlemen to do justice by the people of the city from which they draw so much revenue."

Our answer to this absurd statement is the following facts:

First: We extend our thanks in appreciation of their acknowledgment and confession that we are giving good shows and are getting the money.

Second: Let it be known for the edification of these experienced showmen, as they term themselves, that it is practically impossible for anyone to book any worthwhile production on any sort of short notice and more so for a period of six days on which basis most of our bookings are made.

Third: On the programs for the last road show at the Antlers Theater, a few copies of which we still have on hand, there was printed a long list of coming attractions, and three of them happened to be scheduled for this very week. These programs were printed several weeks ago and the bookings necessarily made prior to that time, which in either event was long before we were aware that our midst was to be invaded by these self-styled benefactors for Roseburg.

Fourth: From this let the public judge as to whether we were forced by this supposedly opposition or whether our statements were true ones.

Fifth: Apparently the management of the Liberty Theater are not aware that there exist certain independent reviews and criticisms on each and every production released and that these are not biased by commercial advertising such as the ordinary published reviews in the trade journals. Surely they have not read these reviews on some of the very productions they list in their lineup, for if so, they would not have been so bold to challenge us to show a superior lineup. For their sake and other good reasons we ignore their foolish challenge.

It is not our desire, neither shall we enter into any prolonged discussion of this antagonistic nature, neither shall we ask of these gentlemen who have assailed our citizenship as to how they have qualified for being Americans. We prefer to let their own misguided statements be their own boomerang. We reiterate our former statement that all of our advertising will contain the truth and nothing but the truth.
