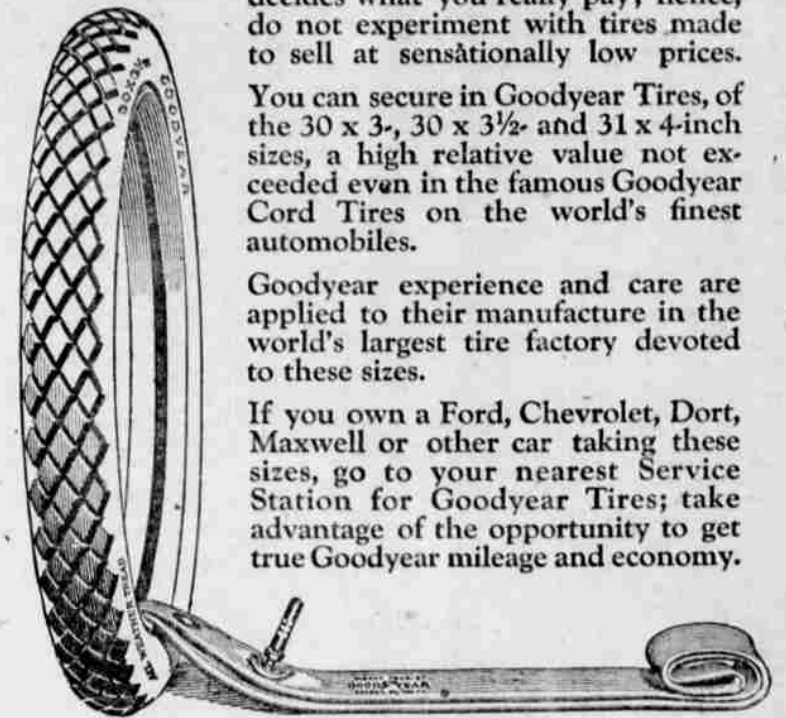

No Depression In Sight Says Friday

Professor David Friday, of the University of Michigan, one of the leading American economists, has declared that the threat of a severe business depression of this country this fall has been averted. Even if such a depression should come within a year or two, it will not be severe he predicts, and never again will the country be called upon to go through such as those suffered in 1873 and 1893-94.

I do not believe there will be a serious depression this fall, said Professor Friday. "It looked threatening last spring, but the situation has changed pretty materially since then."

Sees Four Vital Elements.

"Crops are one of the most important independent determinants of business conditions, and a bad crop situation might well have brought on a depression this autumn by lessening trade, especially in the agricultural districts and so providing a succession of business failures which always precede a panic."

"The labor situation last spring was extremely bad. Labor was never less efficient than it was four months ago, nor was it ever more quarrelsome. If the decline in efficiency had continued, expense of production was sure to increase and financial embarrassments were certain to result."

"Last spring bank credit was expanding in an unprecedented rate in the interior of the country. The state banks of Michigan and Ohio expanded their loans 24 percent in the four months between January 1 and March 4, 1920. At the same time the New York banks were not expanding their loans at all, but had reached the limit of their possible expansion."

As a result the New York situation, the rate for borrowed money there stood at an unprecedented height and stock market securities were undergoing serious fluctuations, amounting almost to a panic. When the New York banks have advanced their possibilities of credit expansion and when the interior banks are still expanding rapidly, the financial situation of the country has reached a point where depression is sure to follow at an early date."

"It seemed clear in the spring that the enormous foreign trade balances which kept industry going at unprecedented prices could not continue much longer."

Labor Situation Improves. "What happened?" "The crop situation improved. The wheat crop is good, we will probably have the largest corn crop in our history."

With wheat, Hubert Astley, a Herefordshire land owner was fined \$250.00.
