Carpenters Will Hold a Convention

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 16.—Plans are being made here to care for the two thousand delegates, alternates and guests who are expected convention of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners to open here on September 20 and will be in session for two weeks.

Candidates for international offices will be nominated preparatory to an election by referendum in November. The brotherhood has a membership of 400,104, in approximately 2,550 local organizations. The president of the organization is W. L. Hutcheson and John T. Cosgrove is vice-president and Frank Duffy secretary. A tablet to Gabriel Edmondson, the first president of the organization will be unveiled during the convention. Mr. Edmondson died in Washington, D. C., last spring.
